Sheriff Clarence Tuhy gave an update on the task force and monthly transports. Veterans Service Officer Leslie Ross introduced Heather Guzik as the new Assistant Veterans Service Officer. Road Superintendent Al Heiser gave an update on road conditions. Road Superintendent Al Heiser reported that the North Dakota Department of

Transportation and the North Dakota Association of Oil and Gas Producing Counties scheduled an emergency meeting with oil counties and the oil industry Friday, June 10, Watford City, 10:00 am - 12:00 noon central time at the McKenzie County Courthouse.

Road Superintendent Al Heiser discussed the bridge collapse by Belfield. Federal aid funds may be available from the North Dakota Department of Transportation. The bridge is being analyzed for bridge replacement or a box culvert.

Road Superintendent Al Heiser reported Stark County was offered 7.3 million dollars with a 90/10 split for paving and 1.605 million dollars with a 25/75 split for gravel and grading. The road projects must be completed by June 30, 2013. Comm. Wolf moved to accept the 7.3 million dollars and allocate 3.4 million for paving and to reject the 1.605 million dollars for gravel and grading. Comm. Elkin seconded. Roll call vote. All voted Aye and the motion carried.

Road Superintendent Al Heiser discussed revisions to the Stark County Residential Subdivision Roadway Standards Policy. Comm. Wolf moved to adopt a resolution revising the Stark County Residential Subdivision Roadway Standards Policy regarding roads, road maintenance and road footages. Comm. Elkin seconded. Roll call vote. All voted Aye and the motion carried.

Sister Phoebe Schwartz, representing Old Red Old Ten Scenic Byway, requested \$11,188 for marketing materials and enhancing their digital presence. The Commission decided to present it to the Park Board.

Chairman Zander made an announcement to call a Special Park Board Meeting at 11:00 A.M., contingent upon contacting the board members.

Lyle Koller, Experience Works, presented information regarding Senior training for job placement in the community.

Comm. Hoff presented a recommendation from the Zoning Board to approve Bakken Developments request for a zoning change from Agricultural to Residential Low Density and the preliminary plat contingent upon approval of a final plat. The location being 40.47 acres located in Lot 4, Section 4, Township 139, Range 94. Comm. Hoff moved to accept the Zoning Board's recommendation to approve Bakken Developments zoning change from Agricultural to Residential Low Density contingent upon approval of final plat and adhering to the new Stark County Subdivision Policy. Comm. Kuntz seconded. Roll call vote. All voted Aye with Comm. Elkin abstaining and the motion carried.

Gayle Elkin, representing Taylor Community Activities Inc., requested funding for the Heritage Hill public restroom project. The Commission decided to present it to the Park Board. The request was added to the Special Park Board meeting.

Comm. Hoff moved to reduce the Social Service Board from nine members to seven members. Comm. Elkin seconded. All voted Aye and motion carried.

Comm. Wolf moved to reappoint Jim Hope, Pete Kuntz and Jay Elkin to the Social Service Board. Comm. Hoff seconded. All voted Aye and motion carried.

Comm. Elkin moved to reappoint Jerry Mayer to the Vector Control Board. Comm. Kuntz seconded. All voted Aye and motion carried.

Discussion was held regarding legislative redistricting, it is required if the population for Stark County increases more than 10%. Stark County's population increased 6.9%. Comm. Wolf moved not to redistrict in Stark County. Comm. Hoff seconded. All voted Aye and the motion carried.

NOTICE OF FILING AND NOTICE OF HEARING

On June 21, 2011, BakkenLink Pipeline, LLC (BakkenLink) filed applications for a certificate of corridor compatibility and a route permit to authorize construction for approximately 144 miles of 8-inch and 12-inch crude oil pipeline in Billings, Dunn, McKenzie, Stark and Williams Counties, North Dakota, as shown on the attached map. The trunkline will have bi-directional capability, and will be able to transport crude oil between Beaver Lodge and a new rail facility at Fryburg, North Dakota. BakkenLink also filed a request for waiver of procedures and time schedules established under North Dakota Century Code Chapter 49-22 and North Dakota Administrative Code Chapter 69-06-06. The Commission finds the applications are complete. A Public Hearing on the applications is scheduled to begin September 1, 2011 at 10 a.m. CDT, McKenzie County Court House, 201 5th Street NW, Watford City, North Dakota, 58854. The issues to be considered are:

1. Is the proposed facility of such length, design, location, or purpose that it will produce minimal adverse effects, or, does a demonstrable emergency exist which requires immediate construction and that adherence to the procedures and time schedules would jeopardize the utility's system?
2. Will the location, construction, and operation of the proposed facilities produce minimal adverse effects on the environment and upon the welfare of the citizens of North Dakota?
3. Are the proposed facilities compatible with the environmental preservation and the efficient use of resources?
4. Will the proposed facility locations minimize adverse human and environmental impact while ensuring continuing system reliability and integrity and ensuring that energy needs are met and fulfilled in an orderly and timely fashion?
