NOTICE OF INTENT TO ISSUE AIR POLLUTION CONTROL MINOR (SYNTHETIC) PERMITS TO OPERATE AND CONSTRUCT

Take notice that the North Dakota Department of Health proposes to issue an Air Pollution Control Permit to Construct (PTC) and a renewal Permit to Operate (PTO) to CHS Inc. for operation of the Minot Pipeline Terminal in accordance with the North Dakota Air Pollution Control Rules. The Minot Pipeline Terminal is located four miles west of Minot in Ward County. The facility provides bulk distribution of petroleum products. The CHS Inc. mailing address is P.O. Box 909, Laurel, MT, 59044-0909. The PTC revises the annual product throughput limits to better reflect the mix of products distributed. The PTO renewal incorporates the conditions of the PTC. These permit revisions will not result in an increase in permitted emissions.

A thirty-day public comment period for the draft permits will begin June 30, 2011 and end on July 30, 2011. Direct comments in writing to the North Dakota Department of Health, Division of Air Quality, 918 E. Divide Avenue, Bismarck, North Dakota 58501-1947. Comments must be received by the end of the public comment period to be considered in the final permit determinations. A public hearing regarding issuance of the permits will be held if a significant degree of public interest exists as determined by the Department. Requests for a public hearing must be received in writing by the Department before the end of the public comment period.

The draft permits and applications are available for review at the above address and at the Ward County Auditor's office in Minot. PUBLIC NOTICE FEMA-3318-EM-ND (Flooding) FEMA-1981-DR-ND (Flooding) FEMA-1986-DR-ND (Severe Winter Storm)

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) hereby gives notice to the public of its intent to reimburse eligible applicants for eligible costs to repair and/or replace facilities damaged by flooding and winter storms beginning April 4, 2011, and continuing. This notice applies to the Public Assistance (PA) and Hazard Mitigation Grant Programs (HMGP) implemented under the authority of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, 42 U.S.C. §§ 5121-5206.

Under one emergency declaration and two major disaster declarations (FEMA-3318-EM-ND; FEMA-1981-DR-ND; and FEMA-1986-DR-ND) signed by the President on April 04, 2011, May 10, 2011, and May 20, 2011, the following counties have been designated as adversely affected by the flooding and storms and eligible for Public Assistance: Barnes, Benson, Billings, Bottineau, Burke, Burleigh, Cass, Cavalier, Dickey, Divide, Dunn, Eddy, Emmons, Foster, Grand Forks, Grant, Griggs, Kidder, LaMoure, Logan, Mercer, McHenry, McIntosh, McKenzie, McLean, Morton, Mountrail, Nelson, Oliver, Pembina, Pierce, Ramsey, Ransom, Renville, Richland, Rolette, Sargent, Sheridan, Steele, Stutsman, Towner, Traill, Walsh, Ward, Wells, and Williams Counties and the portions of the Spirit Lake, Fort Berthold, Turtle Moun-

tain, and Standing Rock Sioux Reservations that lie within these counties. Additionally, all counties and Tribes in North Dakota have been designated as eligible for HMGP. Additional counties may be designated for assistance at a later date.

This public notice concerns activities that may affect historic properties, activities that are located in or affect wetland areas or the 100-year floodplain, and critical actions within the 500-year floodplain. Such activities may adversely affect the historic properties, floodplains or wetlands, or may result in continuing vulnerability to flood damage.

Presidential Executive Orders 11988 and 11990 require that all federal actions in or affecting floodplains or wetlands be reviewed for opportunities to relocate, and be evaluated for social, economic, historic, environmental, legal, and safety considerations. Where there is no opportunity to relocate, FEMA is required to undertake a detailed review to determine what measures can be taken to minimize future damages. The public is invited to participate in the process of identifying alternatives and analyzing their impacts.

FEMA has determined that for certain types of facilities there are normally no alternatives to restoration in the floodplain/wetland. These are facilities that meet all of the following criteria: 1) FEMA's estimate of the cost of repairs is less than 50% of the cost to replace the entire facility, and is less than \$100,000; 2) the facility is not located in a floodway; 3) the facility has not sustained major structural damage in a previous Presidential declared flooding disaster or emergency; and 4) the facility is not critical (e.g., the facility is not a hospital, generating plant, emergency operations center, or a facility that contains dangerous materials, etc.). FEMA intends to provide assistance for the restoration of these facilities to their pre-disaster condition, except that certain measures to mitigate the effects of future disaster events may be included in the work. For example, a bridge or culvert restoration may include a larger waterway opening to decrease the risk of future washouts.

For routine activities, this will be the only public notice provided. Other activities and those involving facilities that do not meet the four above criteria are required to undergo more detailed review, including study of alternate locations. Subsequent public notices regarding such projects will be published, if necessary, as more specific information becomes available.

In many cases an applicant may have started facility restoration before federal involvement. Even if the facility must undergo detailed review and analysis of alternate locations, FEMA will fund eligible restoration at the original location if the facility is functionally dependent on its floodplain location (e.g., bridges and flood control facilities), or the project facilitates an open space use, or the facility is an integral part of a larger network that is impractical or uneconomical to relocate, such as a road. In such cases, FEMA must also examine the possible effects of not restoring the facility, minimize floodplain/wetland impacts, and determine both that an overriding public need for the facility clearly outweighs the Executive Order requirements to avoid the floodplain/wetland, and that the site is the only practicable alternative. The State of North Dakota and local officials will confirm to FEMA that proposed actions comply with all applicable state and local floodplain management and wetland protection requirements.

FEMA also intends to provide HMGP funding to the State of North Dakota to mitigate future disaster damages. These projects may include construction of new facilities, modification of existing, undamaged facilities, relocation of facilities out of floodplains, demolition of structures, or other types of projects to mitigate future disaster damages. In the course of developing project proposals, subsequent public notices will be published, if necessary, as more specific information becomes available.

The National Historic Preservation Act requires federal agencies to take into account the effects of their undertakings on historic properties. These actions or activities affecting buildings, structures, districts, objects 50

years or older, or that affect archeological sites or undisturbed ground will require further review to determine if the property is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places (Register). If the property is determined to be eligible for the Register, and FEMA's undertaking will adversely affect it, FEMA will provide additional public notices. For historic properties not adversely affected by FEMA's undertaking, this will be the only public notice.

As noted, this may be the only public notice regarding the above-described actions under the PA and HMGP programs. NOTICE OF RESCHEDULED HEARING
June 22, 2011**

On December 20, 2010, Northern States Power Company (NSP) filed an application to increase its rates for electric utility service to provide additional 2011 test year annual revenue of \$19,773,000 or a 12.02% increase over current rates, case number PU-10-857.

On February 8, 2011, NSP filed an application to increase its rates for electric utility service to provide additional 2012 test year annual revenue of \$4,226,000 or 2.57%, case number PU-11-55.

On March 24, 2011 the Commission issued a Notice of Hearing, Notice of Intervention Deadline, and Notice of Public Input Sessions, scheduling a public hearing for August 9, 2011. Petitions to Intervene were required by June 10, 2011. The hearing was scheduled to begin August 9, 2011.

On June 6, 2011, NSP and Commission Advocacy Staff filed a stipulation requesting that the hearing be rescheduled to occur beginning October 18, 2011.

Therefore, please take notice that the Public Hearing will be held beginning October 18, 2011 at 8:30 a.m. CDT in the Commission Hearing Room, State Capitol, 12th Floor, Bismarck, North Dakota 58505.

Issues to be considered in this matter are:

1. What is the value of NSP's property, used and useful, for the service and convenience of the public in North Dakota?
2. What is NSP's rate of return on its property, used and useful, for the service and convenience of the public in North Dakota?
3. What is a just and reasonable rate of return on NSP's property, used and useful, for the service and convenience of the public in North Dakota?
4. What rates and charges are necessary to provide a just and reasonable rate of return on NSP's property, used and useful, for the service and convenience of the public in North Dakota?
5. Are NSP's proposed rate schedules designed in such a manner that they result in a basis of charge to its customers that is just and reasonable without discrimination?
6. Other relevant information or proposals concerning the proceeding.
