The boys had a great showing and finished fourth as a team with 80 points following Linton third at 82.5; Hazen second with 125 and Washburn, first, with 127 points.

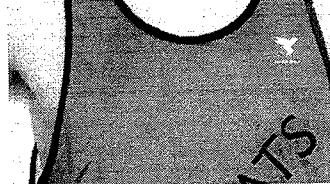
Jacob Fideldy broke his own record in the 3200 meter run and placed third.

On April 6, 2011, Minnesota Power, an operating division of Allete, Inc., (Allete) filed an application for a certificate of site compatibility to authorize construction of a 105 MW Bison 2 Wind Project consisting of 35 wind turbine generators and associated facilities in Morton and Oliver

Counties, North Dakota, as shown on the attached map.

A Public Hearing on the application is scheduled to begin July 7, 2011, at 10:00 a.m. CDT, at the Oliver County Courthouse, 11 West Main, Center, North Dakota 58530. The issues to be considered are:

1. Will the location, construction, and operation of the proposed facilities produce minimal adverse effects on the environment and upon the welfare of the citizens of North Dakota?
2. Are the proposed facilities compatible with the environmental preservation and the efficient use of resources?
3. Will the proposed facility

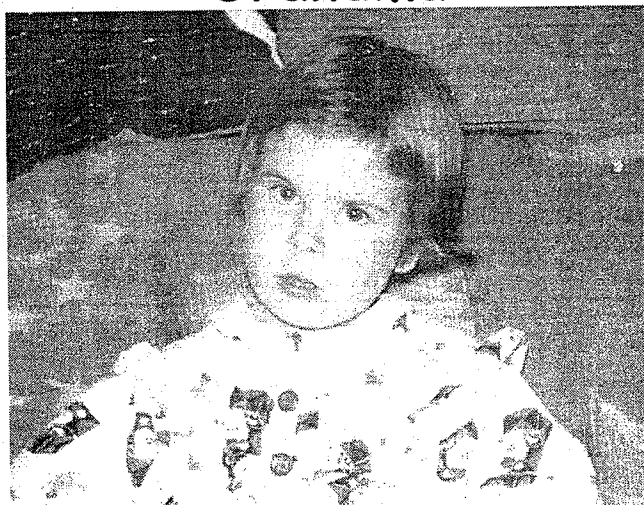

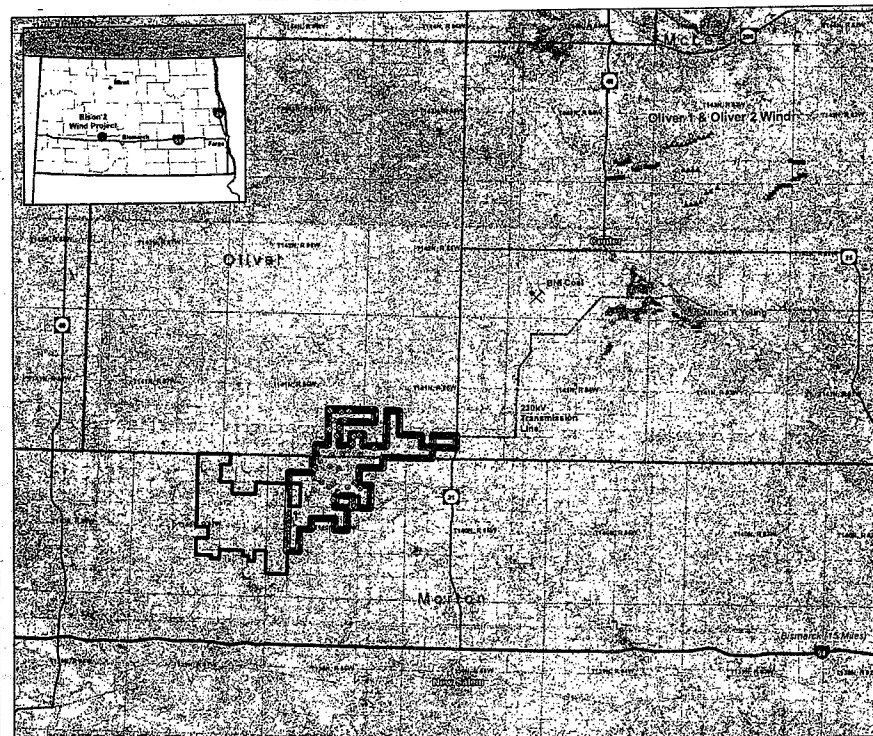
