CITY OF KARLSRUHE NOTICE OF ORDINANCE

This is to inform the public that the City
of Karlsruhe has adopted a new city ordi-
nance to enforce the following:

Storage and Handling of Hazardous Ma-
terials, Hazardous Waste, and Hazardous
Substances, including Anhydrous Ammo-
nia, within the City limits is Prohibited.

(1) The storage or handling of hazardous
materials, hazardous substances, or haz-
ardous wastes within the City of Karlsruhe
is prohibited unless otherwise allowed by
special use permit issued by the City of
Karlsruhe. It shall be unlawful to park an-
hydrous tanks along any streets or anywhere
within the city limits of the City of Karl-
ruhe.

(2) The following definitions shall apply
to this subsection:

(a) Hazardous material shall mean a sub-
stance or material which has been deter-
mined by the Secretary of Transportation to
be capable of posing an unreasonable risk
to the health, safety, and property when
transported in commerce, and which has
been so designated pursuant to Title 49 of
the Code of Federal Regulations at subsec-
tion 171.8.

(b) Hazardous substance shall mean a
material or its mixtures or solutions which
have been identified as a hazardous sub-
stance pursuant to the definitions of Title 49
of the Code of Federal Regulations at sec-

tion 171.8.

(c) Hazardous waste shall mean any ma-
terial that is subject to the hazardous waste
manifest requirements of the United States
Environmental Protection Agency as spec-
ified in Title 40 of the Code of Federal Reg-
ulations, part 262.

Penalties:

Any person who shall violate any of the
provisions of this code hereby adopted or
fail to comply therewith, or who shall vio-
late of fail to comply with any order made
thereunder shall severally for each such vi-
olation, and non-compliance respectively,
be guilty of an offense, punishable by a fine
of not more than Five Hundred Dollars
(\$500.00) or by imprisonment for not more
than thirty (30) days or by both such fine
and imprisonment. The imposition of one
penalty for any violation shall not excuse
the violation or permit it to continue; and all
such persons shall be required to correct or
remedy such violations or defects within a
reasonable time; and when not otherwise
specified, each day that prohibited condi-
tions are maintained shall constitute a sepa-
rate offense.
