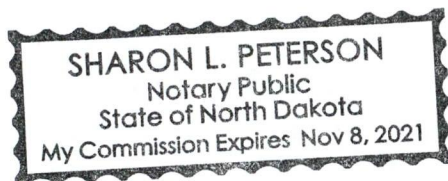

Fall fish surveys show promising future

BISMARCK TRIBUNE STAFF

Fall fish surveys show a
promising future, especially
compared to a year ago, when
many North Dakota waters
were struggling, the Game
and Fish Department reports.

Many lakes had low water
levels going into last winter,
and a heavy snowpack re-
sulted in significant winter-
kill.

"Good moisture through-
out the summer rejuvenated
the habitat in many of the

smaller lakes around the state,
primarily in the central and
southeast," said Scott Gangl,
fisheries management section
leader for Game and Fish.

The fish reproduction sur-
veys evaluate natural repro-
duction, stocking success
and forage abundance. The
cooler, wet summer produced
ideal conditions for stocked
northern pike and walleye,
according to Game and Fish.

"We saw really good sur-
vival and growth on most

stocked species," Gangl said.

Devils Lake saw fair to good
numbers of walleye, similar to
last year, with the catch close
to average.

"However, we saw very
low numbers of yellow perch,
which means there wasn't a
good reproductive year for
perch," Gangl said.

There was a good catch of
young walleye in Lake Saka-
kawea.

"This was a result of a com-
bination of stocking efforts

and natural reproduction,"
Gangl said. "We also saw a
lot of rainbow smelt, so the
forage base is still pretty
solid."

Lake Oahe has had several
years of good reproduction of
walleye, including this year.

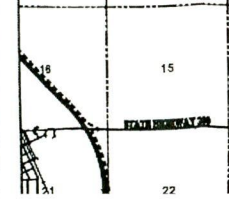
However, "The walleye
population continues to be
dominated by smaller fish,"
Gangl said. "Lake Oahe is
lacking forage, which causes
fish to grow slower than they
should."

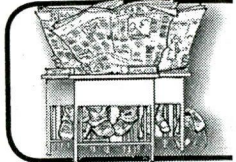
