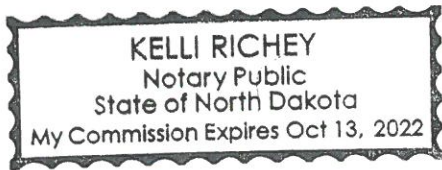

TICKING CLOCK

Decision needed soon on Ryder Cup's 2020 fate

The final weekend in September in Wisconsin was expected to be bustling with good times and gigantic crowds, upward of 45,000 people and some 1,300 vendors taking part in an event steeped in tradition.

But organizers decided "the cautious course is to allow more time for the situation to stabilize" with the unpredictable nature of the COVID-19 pandemic.

So the Warrens Cranberry Festival was canceled.

The news last Tuesday easily was overlooked outside Wisconsin, especially for golf fans caught up in the PGA Tour's celebrated return at Colonial after three months.

It might not even be on the agenda of meetings on the future of the Ryder Cup, scheduled for Sept. 25 to 27 at Whistling Straits along the shores of Lake Michigan, about 160 miles east of the cranberry festival.

Turns out Wisconsin is the No. 1 producer of cranberries in America, just like it is with cheese.

The PGA of America took care of one issue this week when it submitted plans to hold the PGA Championship without spectators Aug. 6 to 9 at Harding Park. That was significant because one option further down the menu would have been moving it out of San Francisco.

Next up is what do to about the Ryder Cup. A decision could come as early as the end of the month.

There are plenty of differences between golf and cranberries, not the least of which is how much money is involved. The Warrens Cranberry Festival does not have mega deals with corporate sponsors or broadcast contracts, nor does it

count 28,000 professionals as members of the association.

This is a complicated decision for the PGA of America, and it's not as simple as postponing it until next year, as was the case in 2001 after the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks.

Among the many moving parts is the Presidents Cup, the event that looks like the Ryder Cup but isn't.

Never mind that the Presidents Cup doesn't have the history, tradition or interest level of the Ryder Cup. It's not even close. But it's a financial boon to the PGA Tour, just like the Ryder Cup is to the PGA of America, even if not to the same degree. And it was a big seller not long after the announcement it would be at Quail Hollow in 2021.

Moving the Ryder Cup back one year would allow for the full experience — for players and fans, even those watching on television. Would a Ryder Cup without fans be that much different from last month's charity match at Seminole?

But not having the Presidents Cup next year would be costly to the PGA Tour, which already is out millions of dollars by supporting some of its tournaments that were canceled to help keep them from going under.

Everyone sacrifices in times like this.

It's important to the Tour to play the Presidents Cup next year. That's why the Tour went to some of the top players last week at Colonial for a survey. Players were asked to prioritize the following scenarios: a Ryder Cup this year with no fans, a Ryder Cup with half the fans or a Ryder Cup in 2022.

The idea of waiting two more years for a Ryder Cup might have been more wishful thinking. It's not going to happen.

And it should be clear by now that a Ryder Cup without fans should not happen.

Brooks Koepka said last week he could see a scenario where players would protest the lack of fans by not playing, and that he "possibly" would be one of

them. Rory McIlroy is adamant the Ryder Cup needs fans and is confident that won't be the case.

"Unlike any other event, fans make the Ryder Cup," Webb Simpson said Tuesday. "I could even see us playing the Masters with no fans, as weird as that would be, but the Ryder Cup is really the 13th player on the team for the home team. ... If they had limited fans, I think you could do it. But it still would be different."

Quail Hollow lost the Wells Fargo Championship this year because of the pandemic. Wells Fargo is supposed to be held outside Washington, D.C., next year because the Presidents Cup is supposed to be at Quail Hollow.

The Ryder Cup ultimately is too big of an event to cut corners, and it already is headed that way because of the pandemic.

Americans have only 11 events remaining to qualify, having lost eight that would have counted toward the standings. Six players automatically make the team instead of eight. The season doesn't even resume for another month with small prize funds for some Europeans who aren't PGA Tour members or face travel hurdles.

But if the 90 days between PGA Tour events felt like a long time, consider that's about how long it is until the Ryder Cup. A lot can change, although decisions will have to come much sooner.

What helps is the relationship between the PGA of America and PGA Tour, which is much improved from a decade ago when there was barely a relationship. The leaders of both — Seth Waugh and Jay Monahan — are close.

Monahan — are close. They won't make the decision any easier.

What to know: The RBC Heritage typically is held the week after the Masters and is known for its easy vibe after the first major of the year. It now is the second week back in golf's return from the COVID-19 pandemic. The top five players in the world are in the field for the second straight week. **Jon Rahm** again has a mathematical chance to overtake **Rory McIlroy** at No. 1 in the world ranking. **Bernhard Langer** from the PGA Tour Champions is playing again. He won in 1985 a week after he won the Masters. The tournament had been held in April every year since 1983. It previously was in March. It was held the last weekend in November when it began in 1969. McIlroy went into the final round at least three shots from the lead and failed to break par in three of his past four events. The past four winners at Hilton Head never had won on the PGA Tour — Pan, **Satoshi Kodaira**, **Wesley Bryan** and **Branden Grace**. The Tour did not report any positive tests for the new coronavirus among players who took the charter flight from Colonial. Players at Hilton Head who are 50 or older include **Langer**, **Vijay Singh**, **Davis Love III** and **Jim Furyk**. **Phil Mickelson**, who turned 50 on Tuesday, is not playing this week.

Yankees president wants MLB talks to resume

Levin says everybody wants to see baseball

NEW YORK (AP) — Yankees President Randy Levine called on the players' association to resume negotiations with Major League Baseball to start the pandemic-delayed season.

Levine said the money difference between the feuding sides was not the primary obstacle but rather issues such as health and safety protocols and determining how to deal with a second

wave of the new coronavirus.

"So what I believe needs to happen is that the parties need to get together as soon as possible to resolve those issues so we can get the season going," he said Tuesday. "All 30 clubs want to play. The commissioner wants to play. The players want to play. So let's get these issues solved so we can begin playing baseball. The March agreement said the players would negotiate these issues. The commissioner has assured me he's ready to do so. The players should get in a room and start negotiating so we can get going."

MLB has made three pro-

posals, the last for a 72-game season starting July 14 that would guarantee about \$1.23 billion of salaries that originally totaled roughly \$4 billion and would increase the total to \$1.45 billion if the postseason is completed.

Players insist they get the full prorated salaries called for in the March 26 agreement with MLB. That deal says the season doesn't have to start unless there are no relevant travel restrictions

in the U.S. and Canada, and that games can be played before fans in all 30 regular-season ballparks.

The union made offered two plans, the last for an 89-game schedule starting July 10 and salaries of \$2.25 billion.

The sides have exchanged proposals digitally, with an occasional video conference. They have not met in person since March 13-14 in Arizona.

"Everyone here wants to get down to business as soon as possible and play games. From what I've discovered, the holdup is not about the number of games or money at this time," Levine said.

"The commissioner has the right under the March agreement to schedule the games as long as the players are paid 100% prorated. The holdup, as I understand it, is about resolving the other items in the March 26 agreement."

"They include final agreement on all of the health and safety protocols, deciding what happens if a season is interrupted by a second wave of the virus, which players can opt out and under what circumstances can they, and a host of issues like that."

Union head Tony Clark said Saturday additional talks would be "futile." Baseball Commissioner Rob Manfred

said Monday the season with in jeopardy.

Since Friday, MLB Deputy Commissioner Dan Halem and union chief negotiator Bruce Meyer have exchanged letters that appeared to be preparation for possible litigation.

"I've been talking to the commissioner on a daily basis. He has been and continues to be dedicated to play a 2020 season," said Levine, who was MLB's chief negotiator from 1995-97. "We all recognize that the players are the heart and soul of the game. I've called them patriots in the past and I believe that today."

NBA lays out vision for Disney restart

Here's some of what awaits NBA players going to Disney next month: game rooms, golf course access, cabanas with misters to combat the heat, fishing areas, bowling, backstaging tours and salon services.

It only sounds like vacation.

The NBA described very specific plans to players and teams for the restart on Tuesday, doing so in a memo and handbook both obtained by The Associated Press. With safety being of the foremost importance during the coronavirus pandemic, players were told they will be tested regularly — but not with the deep nasal swabs — and must adhere to strict physical distancing and mask-wearing policies.

The league and the National Basketball Players Association have been working on the terms of how the restart will work for weeks, all while constantly seeking advice from

medical experts including Dr. Anthony Fauci, perhaps the best-known physician in the country when it comes to the battle against COVID-19.

"My confidence, it didn't exist at the beginning of this virus because I was so frightened by it," union executive director Michele Roberts told AP. "Now having lived, and breathed, and suffered through the hours and hours of understanding the virus, and listening to our experts, and comparing different alternative protocols, I can't even think of anything else we could do short of hermetically seal the players that would keep them safe."

Players must tell their teams by June 24 if they intend to play or not, according to a memo sent to NBPA members. NBA Commissioner Adam Silver has said that if a player does not feel comfortable playing at Disney — whether for health reasons or because of social causes facing the country right

now — then he does not have to report with his team and will not be disciplined, other than losing salary for games missed.

Most teams will arrive in Florida on July 7, 8 or 9. A person with knowledge of the situation said the reigning champion Toronto Raptors, the lone NBA team based outside of the U.S., will be permitted to gather for some pre-camp workouts — under strict guidelines that other teams will follow in their own cities — before that arrival date. The Raptors are likely to train somewhere in Florida, said the person who spoke to AP on condition of anonymity because no deal with a training site has yet been signed.

For the Raptors, it's been an area of concern largely because of current Canadian government regulations that call for a 14-day quarantine for people returning to Canada. Some Raptors players are in Toronto right now; some are in the U.S.

Puck woes: NHL's bottom line facing short-term blow

With so much uncertainty, Larry Quinn can't predict just how severe the NHL's financial losses might be due to the coronavirus pandemic.

That doesn't stop the former Buffalo Sabres managing partner from providing a bleak assessment, at least for the short term.

"They've got big challenges ahead," Quinn said. "And the problem is that you don't know the answers to the questions you have to ask."

The questions are many at a time the NHL hopes to go ahead with a 24-team expanded playoff format in a bid to conclude the season with no clear timetable of when to open the next one. It could be as late as January, though Commissioner Gary Bettman has said it would be a full 82 games.

Many NHL issues are similar to those facing North America's other major professional leagues, such as when fans will be allowed to attend games. Others are more distinct to hockey, such as the effect the drop of the Canadian dollar will have on a league with seven of its 31 teams based north of the border.

The NHL was a \$2.3 billion business with a \$39 million salary cap coming out of the lockout that wiped out the 2004-05 season. It broke the \$5 billion mark in 2018-19, with an \$81.5 million cap this past season.

Quinn said the NHL's bottom line could be sheared in half in the short term, effectively erasing the gains made since owners and players reached a revenue-sharing agreement following the lockout. The anticipated drop in revenue has already caused a large ripple through the league.

At least 10 teams have laid off employees or announced indefinite furloughs, with many executives taking pay cuts. Just this week, the Sabres made a drastic series of cost-cutting moves by firing general manager Jason Botterill and his assistants, 12 of 21 scouts and their entire minor league coaching staff. Owner Terry Pegula specifically cited uncertain times raised by the pandemic, and a desire to become a "leaner" and "more efficient" operation.

Players are bracing for lost salaries by continuing to defer whether to receive their final paychecks. They are also in jeopardy of losing the portion of pay put aside in an escrow account, which rolls over to the owners should revenue fall short of projections; players have lost upward of

10% of their pay to escrow over the past seven-plus seasons and it is a major issue in upcoming labor talks.

Former NHL executive-turned-broadcaster Brian Burke said the pain will be felt by teams and players alike.

"I said seven weeks ago, if we lost this season and part of next season, I could foresee a \$40 million salary cap," he added. "I don't think it's going to get to that point. And I know one option that's being discussed is deferral of some of these wages they're paid and see what happens, and when the revenue bounces back they can get paid."

Bettman recently said gate receipts, while significant, don't make up a majority of league revenue. But gate revenue is key to the NHL because it lags behind its counterparts in television dollars.

The NHL has a 10-year, \$2 billion deal with NBC, that expires after next season. It has a 12-year deal with Canada's Rogers TV that began in 2014-15, and is worth \$5.2 billion Canadian. In comparison, the NFL makes more than \$5 billion annually from broadcasting rights agreements.

The Canadian dollar plays a major role in league finances, with player salaries paid in U.S. currency. That wasn't an issue in 2007, when the Canadian dollar briefly jumped above par, which was reflected in the NHL's salary cap making its largest two-year gain, going from \$44 million in 2006-07 to \$56.7 million in 2008-09.

That's not the case today, with the Canadian dollar at the 75-cent range. Teams north of the border project losing \$400,000 each time the Canadian dollar drops a penny, putting a strain on their ability to compete for or retain high-priced talent.

The uncertainty has led to all general managers unable to assess their rosters and payrolls beyond this season.

"What happens to the cap? Does the cap go down because revenues are going to decrease? Do they artificially keep it where it's at?" Washington Capitals GM Brian MacLellan said. "Those are just open-ended questions, and we discuss them, but we don't come up with any answers."

Issues arising from the pandemic have slowed negotiations on a new collective bargaining agreement, with the current deal expiring in September 2022.

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

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ND asks residents to get tested for COVID-19

BISMARCK — North Dakota ranks among the top states in the country in COVID-19 testing per capita, but the state's capacity to test residents has outgrown demand for testing, Gov. Doug Burgum said at a press conference on Tuesday, June 16.

Burgum said the state can now process 5,000 tests per day, however the Department of Health has announced more than 4,000 tests only once since the pandemic began.

Until recently, North Dakota heavily prioritized testing for vulnerable people, those who work around them and residents showing symptoms of the illness.

In an effort to boost demand, Burgum announced last week state and health officials would begin holding testing events open to the public in the state's largest metro areas. Officials ran two free events in Fargo last week and will hold more over the next two weeks. Similar events will be held in Bismarck and Minot this week and Grand Forks next week. There is no proof of insurance or residency required to get tested at the events.

Burgum also said the state will be doing outreach to businesses, especially large manufacturing firms, to set up testing events

for employees. He said interested businesses should contact the health department's operation center.

The governor also encouraged family members who would like to visit someone in nursing homes to seek testing. He said the state will be kicking off a pilot project at the Augusta Place living community in Bismarck that will give family members an option to get tested before allowing indoor visitation. North Dakota is one of the first states to allow any kind of visitation in nursing homes.

Burgum said the state is in a strong position in the fight against the illness, but he noted that residents shouldn't get careless now that many aspects of life are returning to normal.

"The set of cards that we have in North Dakota — we wouldn't want to trade them with anyone right now," Burgum said. "But there are still places in this country with exponential growth (of COVID-19), so we need to continue to stay on guard."

Despite the state's relative success in keeping infection rates low, major challenges lie ahead, Burgum said. The state has never had students in schools and college with the threat of COVID-19 hanging in the air. The governor said the state will make a strong effort to test college students, especially those living in dorms,

as they go back to class in the fall.

Earlier in the day, the North Dakota Department of Health announced 23 new cases of COVID-19.

Nine of the new cases Tuesday came from Cass County, which includes Fargo and West Fargo. The county now has had 2,067 known cases, but the department reports that more than 85% of the residents who once had the illness in the county have recovered. About 55% of the currently infected North Dakotans reside in Cass County, but the county's share of the state's active cases has dropped dramatically in the last two weeks.

Nine new cases came from Burleigh County, which encompasses Bismarck. The county now has 44 active cases, the second most in the state.

The other five new cases Tuesday came from Grand Forks, McLean, Morton, Ransom and Walsh counties.

The department says 74 North Dakotans have died from the illness, all but 12 of whom were residents of Cass County. Fifty-six of the deaths have come in nursing homes and other long-term care facilities. The department has not reported a new death from the illness since Thursday.

COVID-19 as the official cause of death for 65 of the state's victims. Eight were determined to have died primarily because of another condition while infected with COVID-19, and one more death record is pending. The department also notes that three people not included in the official death count were presumed to have died from COVID-19 but did not test positive while they were alive.

The state announced Tuesday that visitation of behavioral health patients will now be allowed at the State Hospital in Jamestown. Those who would like to visit must make

appointments beforehand and wear masks around the hospital's facilities.

A total of 3,101 North Dakota residents have tested positive, but 2,683 have recovered. There are 26 residents hospitalized with the illness, down five from Monday.

A total of 135,691 tests have been performed, but some residents have been tested more than once. Burgum said the state is performing regular testing of those living and working in nursing homes.

Mr. Veldkamp moved, seconded by Mr. Haut to approve the consent agenda which consisted of March 16, 2020 Regular Board meeting minutes, payment of bills, and open enrollments: 2 Jamestown Kindergarten students, a 7th grade Jamestown student, 2-6th grade Jamestown students, a 3rd grade Jamestown student, a 4th grade Jamestown student to Montpelier Public School for the 2020-2021 school year and Pre-K Jamestown student to Carrington Public School for the 2019-2020

school year. Roll call with unanimous "yes" vote. Motion carried.

Superintendent Lech reminded board members to unmute when voting.

Superintendent Lech reported on Laurie Christiansen who is being recommended hire for the Health Careers Teacher position at the James Valley Career and Technology Center. She has a education and health care background and taught at Kensal Public Schools.

Superintendent Lech reported on the Virtual Learning Plan that the governor requested due to the COVID 19 pandemic. The plan would explain in detail how our virtual learning plan would include our Standard Based Instruction and would reach all K-12 grade students. This also includes special education services, EL learners, 504 plans, at risk, etc. The plan had three steps for approval: Department of Public Instruction, Superintendent Baesler and the Governor.

Superintendent Lech recognized Mike Armitage for his tireless work in the district to ensure devices were ready for students, set up a help desk, and also primary contact to get internet access to families who needed it. The district engaged with local internet providers (Daktel and CSI) to provide internet serves and partnered with AT & T to provide wireless hotspots for 20 families. Knights of Columbus generously donated funds to cover the cost of the hotspots.

Superintendent Lech reported he is impressed with our teachers and support staff for continuing to effectively transition to online learning. The teachers have worked hard to move quickly to put the plan in motion. Support staff is continuing to work for limited hours. The Governor's forgiveness of the days and approval of the virtual learning plan, the District will receive full funding. As such, we are planning to pay all support staff at their regular wage for regular hours for the remainder of the 2019-2020 school year. The Governor has encouraged to keep all staff so when we return to school we will be fully staffed.

Superintendent Lech reported attendance will be assessed by engagement of assignments. Support staff and counselors are contacting students who are not engaging. They are watching for any barriers the students may have. Percentage of learning for students will have teachers prioritize to be able to have students move to the next level. The pandemic's impact on ACT and SAT testing is on hold due to the need to follow the state law for these tests. The high school para educators are working with seniors that may need assistance to reach graduation requirements. Students on IEP or 504 have special plans to meet those needs.

Superintendent Lech reported the hot lunch program is continuing to provide free meals. The free meals are for children 18 years old and under. This program is an extension of the summer program. The first day we had 212 meals and last Friday we were over 600 meals. We added to the ability to process orders on line. A request to have Louis L'Amour as a drop off sight has been approved. The delivery process is going well. Shelley Mack would be the person to contact for lunch balance refunds.

Superintendent Lech reported on schools struggling with spring coaches and the need to honor those contracts because they have committed to the District even though the sport season is not available due to the pandemic. The District will not fill any empty coaching positions. Mr. Roldson, Mr. Stilwell, Mrs. Ost and Dr. Lech reviewed the process. The district will honor the signed contracts for spring coaches. The coaches were given guidelines to contact students who would be in their sport and work virtually and also to review their program for improvements. Spring coaches are doing well with the guidelines. Mrs. Ost,

Business Manager, is working on re-funds for spring activity participation fees.

Superintendent Lech reported at this time there are no specific plans for summer school. He is working on several plans with administrators to provide this service to students according to what the guidelines may be in place during the pandemic.

Superintendent Lech reported the Dollar for Scholars board asked if he would ask board members to become members of this program. This program provides scholarships to Jamestown High School students.

Especially to a mid-sized town like Valley City, activities and sports are incredibly important to those who care. A considerable facet of speech and debate for VCHS is the capability to compete at the National Speech and Debate Association Competition. While many extracurriculars were canceled or challenged due to the advance of COVID-19, the speech was no different. When the NDH-SAA officially canceled the in-state season, the list of National Qualifiers was released. As planned, the Sanborn Veterans Park will feature black granite obelisks in a center, cement circle, amidst the grassy expanse. The obelisks will bear engraved names of veterans in the different branches of the military, with the American Flag and POW/MIA Flag flying above. Two

benches will be placed in the center of the obelisk circle, dedicated to the Eckelson-Sanborn Legion post #202 and Legion Auxiliary Post #202.

The original deadline to submit veterans' names to be engraved on the monuments was June 2, 2020, but with COVID-19 and all that the area and country have been facing, that deadline has been extended indefinitely.

Those who wish to have a veteran's name engraved on the granite obelisk of their branch of service are asked to submit the veteran's full military name, nick-

name, branch of service, home state and indicate if he or she was killed in action. Mail the information and \$100 payment to Sanborn Veterans Park, PO Box 84, Sanborn, ND 58480 and the committee will ensure it is included.

The committee also wants people to know that the name engraving is open to every veteran, no matter when/where they served or where they're from.

“This park is for all veterans,” Chairman Joe Pesek says. “Monuments will be placed for each branch of service and the opportunity to have veterans names en-

graved is open to all.”

In addition to veterans' names for the obelisks, businesses or individuals who donate \$1,000 to the memorial will also be recognized by being named on one of the benches.

This unique, one-of-a-kind Park, which the committee hopes will open in summer 2021, will be a tranquil, solemn place where our military's veterans are honored with an everlasting salute.

“We will not get by with lax observation of the rules this Fall when we have hundreds of people moving here from places all over the country, almost all of which have higher COVID prevalence than Barnes County,” said Dr. James Buhr, Health Officer for City-County Health District. “This means masking indoors, even when you are 6 feet from the nearest person. Commerce Business Briefing Call

The North Dakota Department of Commerce today announced that a special Business Briefing call will be held this Thursday, June 18, at 9 a.m., in response to the latest updates regarding the Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) and the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loan.

The U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) announced on Monday, June 15, that the EIDL and EIDL Advance program portal was reopened to further meet the needs of small businesses, nonprofits and agriculture businesses experiencing economic impacts due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The EIDL program offers long-term, low-interest assistance for small businesses or nonprofits to provide economic support to help alleviate temporary loss of revenue. The assistance can be used to cover payroll and inventory, make debt payments or fund other expenses.

In addition to the EIDL program, the EIDL Advance can provide up to \$10,000 (\$1,000 per employee) of emergency economic relief to businesses that are currently experiencing temporary difficulties. The advance does not have to be repaid and applicants

can receive an advance without being approved for the loan.

“Time is of the essence when applying for EIDL funding,” North Dakota U.S. Small Business Administration Director Al Haut said. “Businesses and nonprofits are highly encouraged to apply for funding in a timely matter as recipients will receive money on a first-come, first-serve basis.”

The SBA resumed processing EIDL applications that were submitted before the portal stopped accepting new applications on April 15 and will be processing submitted applications on a first-come, first-served basis.

In addition to the EIDL updates, the U.S. Senate passed the House version of Paycheck Protection Program legislation, tripling the time allotted for small businesses and other PPP loan recipients to spend the funds and still qualify for forgiveness of the loans.
