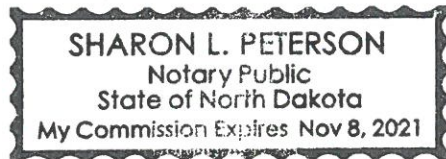

Silver with a shocking twist

Russia takes gold after Biles withdraws

TOKYO — The subject turned to TikTok in what ranks among the most bizarre post-competition news conferences in the austere history of the Olympic Games, and U.S. gymnast Jordan Chiles was talking about how they've been watching and making videos on the social media app to pass the time in the Athletes Village.

"People are just so funny on that thing," Chiles said. "You sit in your room and watch (a video of) a cat fall from the ceiling. You're like, 'What? That makes no sense.'"

Which perfectly sums up the evening at Tokyo's Ariake Gymnastics Centre, and these entire Olympics for that matter.

Russia shocked the heavily favored U.S. women to win the team title by a surprisingly wide margin when Simone Biles decided after a botched opening vault that mentally she was "not there" and her teammates would have to finish the most important competition of their lives without arguably the greatest gymnast in history.

Was she hurt?
"No injury, thankfully," Biles said.

Then what?
"Today has been really stressful," Biles said. "I tried going out here and have fun. The warmup in the back went a little better, but once I came out here, I was like, 'No, mental is not there. So I just need to let the girls do it and focus on myself.'"

The Americans' first rotation was on the vault, Biles' signature discipline with her explosive height that allows her to complete 2 1/2 revolutions before landing. But she got "lost in the air" and only did 1 1/2, nearly landing on her knees and taking a big step forward to stabilize herself. Her score: 13.766.

Her score in Sunday's prelims: 15.183.

She walked off the mat with a mix of anger, shock and disappointment etched across her face, slung her backpack over her shoulder and disappeared out of the arena with the trainer. She returned during warmups for their next rotation at the uneven bars, briefly put on her hand grips, then took them off, pulled on a sweatshirt and became a cheerleader.

Chiles was forced to take Biles' spot in the bars and beam. Suni Lee subbed in the final rotation of the floor exercise.

Russia built a 2.5-point lead after the bars, then fell twice on the balance beam and the Americans edged ahead by .07 points.

But Viktoria Listunova built the margin back to .8 points entering the floor, and Chiles got an 11.700 after falling on her floor routine.

With 166.096 points, the Americans actually were closer to Great Britain in third (164.096) than the Russians in first (169.528).

The individual all-around is Thursday, and Biles, the defending champion, was noncommittal whether she'd compete.

On March 6, 1976, in Case No. 9322, the Commission issued Certificate of Corridor Compatibility No. 2 to Cooperative Power Association and United Power Association, designating a corridor for the construction, operation and maintenance of a 252.4 mile, 400 kVDC electric transmission line in McLean, Burleigh, Kidder, Stutsman, LaMoure, Ransom, Sargent, and Richland Counties of North Dakota.

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Rocklake farmers battle drought after years of flooding

ROCKLAKE, N.D. – Carrie Moore got all of her fields seeded in the drought year of 2021. That's one of the upsides of the dry conditions for the Rocklake farmer who typically has to seed around about 50 acres of sloughs and ponds.

On the downside, her crops now are struggling and showing signs of going backward because of lack of rain. Only about 7.5 inches of rain have fallen in 2021, and last fall also was dry, Moore said.

Moore, and her husband, Jason, like other farmers across northeast North Dakota and northwest Minnesota, are dealing with abnormally dry conditions after years of being excessively wet.

North Dakota topsoil moisture supplies were rated 41% very short, 46% short and 13% adequate for the week ending Sunday, July 25, according to National Agricultural Statistics Service-North Dakota.

The Moores, who have been farming since 2012, switched their roles three years ago. Jason, who had been farming full-time and trucking part-time, became a full-time trucker, and Carrie, who had worked as Town-er County Conservation District director, quit that job to farm. The arrange-

ment gives her the flexibility to stay home with the couple's three children when Jason is gone overnight on long hauls.

Among Carrie Moore's duties as full-time farmer is scouting her fields. A recent check indicated the drought has taken a toll on the wheat and barley, she said.

Wheat stands, for example, are uneven. Some fields haven't headed out, others are starting to head out and still others are beginning to turn from green to gold. Part of the wheat that is headed out doesn't look like it should, Moore said.

"There are a lot of heads that didn't fill right. They're half the size and really deformed. They were trying to fill with seed when it was really hot," Moore said. "Half of the stuff I

walked through was like that. I don't know if that will cut our yield in half, because the head is half the size."

Just two years ago, in 2019, wheat and barley fields were so wet that the Moores couldn't harvest them. Instead, they burned most of their wheat crop the following spring. The fields still were too wet to plant in spring 2020, even after burning.

"It's one extreme to the other. I wish we could find a happy medium," Moore said during a break from haying on a field in Crocus Township, just outside of Egeland, N.D., which is about 20 miles south of the Moores' Rocklake farm.

Moore puts up big, round bales of hay for Nelson Angus Ranch near Egeland. The hayfield she was baling on a mid-July

day was poor quality, but the Nelsons, like other ranchers who are short on feed, will mix it with other forage to boost its nutritional value.

Cattle producers are searching for feed because the drought has devastated their pastures and drastically reduced forage yields. Many ranchers already have reduced herd numbers, and they're concerned about finding enough feed for the remainder of the year.

"This year, in the drought, we're trying to get quantity over quality," Moore said. Meanwhile, water holes are drying up, and many of

the ones that do remain contain blue-green algae, which is toxic to livestock.

A lack of available water also appears to have discouraged bees from pollinating the Moores' canola fields, she said.

"I'm glad we didn't fertilize it because I'm worried about pollination. There's no water for pollinators – no puddles, nothing," Moore said.

While it's unlikely the wheat, barley and canola will yield well this year, she still has hope for good soybeans yields because a couple of July rains fell in time to benefit that crop. Meanwhile

the Moores' soybean input costs so far are low, because they didn't fertilize the soybeans.

Moore hopes flea beetles won't attack the soybeans, since spraying for them would raise production costs.

"As long as we don't have to spray for those, I think our soybeans are going to pull us through," Moore said.

The Moores' fields will need rain if they are going to get soybeans or any other type of crop next year.

"It's going to be tough going into next year if we don't get anything," she said. "I don't know what we'd do."

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE LAMOURE COUNTY BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONER MEETING- July 6, 2021
The Board of LaMoure County Commissioners met Tuesday, July 6, 2021, with Chairman Lee Miller, Commissioners Bruce Klein, Bob Flath, Keith Heidinger, and Jason Weigel, Highway Superintendent Josh Loegering, Auditor Jan Hamlin, and Art Hagebock from the LaMoure Chronicle at the courthouse. Attending by teleconference were State's Attorney James Shockman, DES/911 Coordinator Kimberly Robbins, Public Health Director Jessica

Duffy, and Christine Henderson from the Edgeley Mail. Chairman Miller called the meeting to order at approximately 8:30 a.m. with the pledge to the flag.

Chairman Miller asked for additions to the agenda. There weren't any additions. Comm Heidinger made a motion to approve the agenda, seconded by Comm Klein. All voting aye, motion carried.

Comm Weigel made a motion to approve the June 15th minutes, seconded by Comm Heidinger. All voting aye, motion carried.

Highway Superintendent, Josh Loegering, gave his report. Josh said that the final certification of local match for the CR 62 overlay project needs to be signed. This form means that the county didn't use any other federal funds to pay for this project. The county used the farm to market account. Comm Flath made a motion to sign the final certification of local match for the CR 62 overlay project, seconded by Comm Weigel. All voting aye, motion carried. CR 66 shoulder pulls are almost finished and there are two miles left to gravel. The county will then start the township shoulder pulls. The bridge bundling projects anticipated start date is in early August. Chip sealing will be done July to early August. They will be working on CR 62 from county line to CR 34, City of LaMoure (3 tankers), and City of Edgeley (5 tankers). The crew will then do crack sealing on CR 35 west of Dickey. Josh will meet with TrueNorth Steel tomorrow to look at the CR 34 bridge and get an estimate for the cost to repair. The abutments are good but the deck is undersized. They might be able to replace the deck with a prefab bridge for under \$100,000. The crew will do one mile of auto seal this year.

Public Health Director, Jessica Duffy, gave her COVID report. The vaccine is working. Most cases hospitalized have not been vaccinated. One case of the new Delta Variant has been identified in North Dakota. The vaccine is effective, but less effective against the Delta Variant as compared to earlier variants. Early studies show that natural immunity is not effective against the Delta Variant. LaMoure County has had a total of 537 positive cases. As of June 29, 2021 there are zero active cases. LaMoure County had 17 confirmed deaths "due to COVID". There have been eight tests done in the last seven days. Guidance remains the same to social distance six feet, mask if not vaccinated, wash hands, and avoid large gatherings. Follow the direction from the ND Department of Health and the CDC for best practices. If you are sick, stay home and get vaccinated. Surveillance testing occurs in the office on Thursday mornings from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. Walk-ins are welcome. If you are sick, see your healthcare provider for appropriate diagnosis. Over 3,087 first and second doses have been given to residents, 387 have been administered in the last two months. LaMoure County reports that 50.5% have had at least one dose of the COVID vaccine and the goal is 70%. Nurses are holding pop up clinics for all shots across the county. The Pfizer vaccine has been approved for 12 and older. LaMoure County Public Health has both Pfizer and Moderna on hand. Those 20 and 30 years of age are the least vaccinated age groups in LaMoure County. LaMoure County has had low numbers of COVID cases for three months. LaMoure County Public Health has adequate emergency supplies on hand. Vaccinations are working in the fight against COVID. LaMoure County Public Health currently has adequate fiscal resources designated to respond to COVID emergencies. Jessica's recommendation is to rescind the Emergency Declaration. Comm Heidinger made a motion to rescind the COVID Emergency Declaration, seconded by Comm Klein. All voting aye, motion carried.

Tax Director, Denise Porter, joined the meeting for equalization decisions. Comm Klein made a motion to give the Godlewski parcel numbers 38-0117120 and 38-0117060 a 10% obsolescence factor decrease on the container houses only, seconded by Comm Weigel. All voting aye, motion carried. Comm Weigel made a motion to leave the value as assessed on the Ronald Klein property, parcel number 34-1433110, due to the fact the garage has been there for a period of time and has never been assessed to that parcel, seconded by Comm Heidinger. All voting aye, motion carried.

Comm Klein made a motion to deny the request for a decrease on the property ag land value for Jack and Jan Schulz, parcel number 21-0503150, seconded by Comm Heidinger. All voting aye, motion carried. Their concern was with the ag land value and that will need to be addressed at the state. Denise reported that the new values for residential will be coming in high. Denise is having some program issues with the values being transferred from Vanguard to the county software program. Denise is working with the state on these issues. The ag and commercial values are okay. It was decided to table setting the county values and revisit at the next meeting.

Auditor, Jan Hamlin, let the commissioner know this is the year for redistricting the county. The official publication of the 2020 census data is prompted when the census data for the state is transmitted to the Governor. This action sets in motion the process of redistricting for counties. The estimated date is August 16, 2021. Jan would like to start the process of forming a redistricting board. The board will consist of the Chairman of Board of County Commissioners (also serves as the Chairman of the redistricting board), the State's Attorney, a citizen or governing board member of the largest city, a township supervisor selected by the township supervisors at the township supervisors meeting convened by the county auditor, a citizen at large selected by representatives from each of the cities, excluding the largest city, and the county auditor, as ex officio, nonvoting member for the purpose of advising the restricting board on other existing election districts and precinct boundaries. Jan stated that the State's Attorney will help us through the redistricting process. The redistricting will need to be finished by December 31, 2021.

The Memorial Park Board quarterly meeting was called to order by Park Board Chairman Lee Miller at approximately 9:16 a.m. Park Board members present were: Bruce Klein, Bob Flath, Jason Weigel, Billi Warcken, Sonya Albertson, and Park Supervisor Kevin Shockman. Absent was Curwood Seefeldt. There was one addition to the agenda which was seasonal camping issues. Supervisor, Kevin Shockman, would like to see changes in the policy manual. He would like campers to make reservations instead of the first come first-served policy. There are instances when single campers are coming and parking in the group spots. That spot could have held three campers and now has one camper on it. Also, something needs to be put in the policy to address four wheelers at night. The other issue happening is that seasonal spots have visitors coming and leaving their camper unplugged so aren't paying when they aren't plugged in. The board told Kevin that everyone needs to pay per day whether their camper is plugged in or not. The board wasn't comfortable with making

any policy changes half way through a season. The changes need to be made before next season begins. The entrance lights are not working but Kevin is looking into getting them repaired. Kevin said that the new well is testing high for arsenic. He is waiting for information from the state on how you can filter it. A few board members and Kevin went to Willowbank Colony to view a cement building to see if that would work for a new campground bath house. They found out the cost would be very high, \$200,000, for the shell only. Quotes earlier this year were \$100,000 for a new building and a remodel of \$30,000 plus \$25,000 for plumbing. It was decided to get a cleaning company in to clean for now and get new quotes. The playground equipment has been delivered but not installed. Cement needs to be laid and the contractor has not been in contact with Kevin. A motion was made by Mr. Klein to order a new sign for the park, seconded by Mr. Flath. All voting aye, motion carried. Billi Warcken will order the new sign. There was discussion about having a garbage dumpster put in front of the museum. The museum board will discuss it at their meeting on Thursday. There was also discussion about the trees in front of the museum. It was decided to leave the trees for now and cut them down if needed when they get bigger. The raises for the 2021 season are as follows: seasonal employees received a 50-cent raise and the park supervisor received a 75-cent raise. Kevin said that the tree by the shop needs trimming and will contact Z's Trees to do the work. The Memorial Park Board Meeting adjourned at 10:22 a.m.

Break 10:22 a.m. to 10:32 a.m.

The Commissioner meeting reconvened. Auditor, Jan Hamlin, informed the commissioners there haven't been any applicants for the LaMoure County School District Reorganization Board.

Comm Heidinger made a motion to approve the bills, seconded by Comm Klein. All voting aye, motion carried.

CITY OF STEELE STEELE, ND AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE 82

Amendment to Ordinance 82, Governing All Terrain Vehicles and Utility Task Vehicles.

Rules for Operation of All-Terrain Vehicles

SECTION A

1. "Off-highway vehicle" or "OHV" means any motorized vehicle not designed for use on a highway and capable of cross-country travel on land, snow, ice, marsh, swampland, or other natural terrain.

2. "Operate" means to ride in or on and control the operation of an all-terrain vehicle.

3. "Operator" means a person who operates or is in actual physical control of an all-terrain vehicle.

4. "Owner" means a person, other than a leinholder, having the property in or title to an all-terrain vehicle and entitled to its use or possession.

5. "Utility Task Vehicle" (UTV) means any motorized utility/off road vehicle designed with the seating for the operator and one or more passengers, side by side, and a steering wheel control.

SECTION B

1. An OHV may only be operated in accordance with the rest of the requirements on city streets if:

a. The OHV is a "Class III off-highway vehicle" that weighs less than 8,000 pounds (3628.74 kilograms); travels on tracks, or four or more tires; has a seat; has a wheel for steering control; and is designed for or capable of cross-country on or over land, water, sand, ice, marsh, swampland, or other natural terrain, but does not include a vehicle registered by the state under N.D.C.C. chapter 39-04 or 39-24.

b. Only an OHV with a minimum width of 50 inches meeting the requirements of this Section may be operated on city streets. No other class of OHV's are allowed to operate upon any road, street or highway in this city kept open for vehicular traffic.

2. All speeds, stops, and other city traffic laws must be obeyed.

3. Requirements:
a. A manufacturer-installed or equivalent muffler in good working order and connected to the OHV's exhaust system.

b. An individual may not operate an OHV without having in possession a valid driver's license.

c. When an OHV is operated within city limits, headlamps, and tail lamps must always be on.

d. An individual may not operate an OHV within the city limits towing a trailer, unless the trailer being towed is connected to the OHV by a secure hitch.

e. A passenger under the age of 18 must wear a safety helmet meeting United States Department of Transportation Standards.

f. OHV must be insured.

g. An operator of an OHV may not carry a passenger while operating the vehicle unless the OHV is equipped and recommended by the manufacturer to carry a passenger and the passenger is carried as recommended by the manufacturer.

SECTION C

1. To operate a OHV on city streets, the OHV must be equipped with all of the following:

a. one mirror on the driver side and one mirror on the passenger side;

b. a horn;

c. a speedometer;

d. two tail/brake lights;

e. two headlights;

f. a motor of at least 550 cubic centimeters;

g. a factory installed roll cage;

h. turn signals on the front and rear of the vehicle;

i. factory installed suspension;

j. a metal license plate centered on the rear of the vehicle, with a license plate light.

2. Both headlights and taillights must be on at all times while the vehicle is in operation. No auxiliary lights may be turned on while the vehicle is in operation.

3. If the vehicle is being operated with tracks, they must be made of rubber or similar material. No metal can come in contact with the street surface while the vehicle is in operation.
