

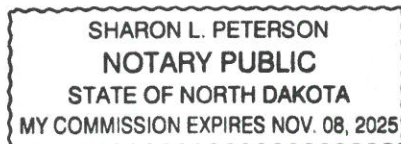

North made a preemptive raise to four hearts. After both opponents had passed, there was a slight risk that he would preempt

his partner rather than the opponents, but no other bid appealed.

West led the spade ace, and East signaled with the queen, promising the jack (or a most unlikely singleton). West continued with the spade king and spade three.

Declarer trumped East's jack, cashed the club ace, ruffed a club on the board, played a trump back to hand and trumped his last club. He cashed dummy's diamond ace, ruffed dummy's fourth spade, drew the final trump and played a diamond to the queen. He would have been all right if West had had the diamond king or if East had started with king-doubleton. As it was, though, South finished down one.

West suggested that

East should have played the spade two at trick one. A diamond switch at trick two would have defeated the contract.

North pointed out that the contract was cold after trick three. Declarer should cash the club ace, ruff a club in the dummy, play a trump back to hand, ruff the last club and cash the heart jack. Then South leads dummy's spade nine. When East produces the 10, declarer discards a diamond loser from his hand. East is endplayed. He must either lead a diamond into dummy's ace-queen or play a club, which allows declarer to sluff his second diamond loser from hand and ruff in the dummy.

# Details emerge about victims of July Fourth mass shooting

The parents of a toddler. A father of eight and a grandfather to many. A synagogue employee known for her kindness. A family man who loved the arts.

A mass shooting during the Highland Park Independence Day parade has now claimed the lives of seven people and left some two dozen others injured, ranging in age from 8 to 85 years old.

Authorities have identified the seven dead as: Irina McCarthy, 35 and her husband Kevin McCarthy, 37, of Highland Park; Nicolas Toledo-Zaragoza, 78, of Morelos, Mexico; Katherine Goldstein, 64, of Highland Park; Stephen Straus, 88, of Highland Park; Jacquelyn "Jacki" Sundheim, 63, of Highland Park; and Eduardo Uvaldo, 69, of Waukegan. Here is what we know about some victims of the shooting:

**Irina and Kevin McCarthy**

The McCarthys were fatally shot while watching the parade with their tod-

dlar son. Aiden McCarthy, 2, was found wandering alone and bloodied in the chaotic aftermath of the shooting as strangers sought to reunite him with his family.

His photo was shared across Chicago-area social media groups. On Tuesday, it emerged that Aiden's parents were among the seven people killed when gunfire erupted at the start of the parade.

Aiden's grandfather, Michael Levberg, said that he was eventually reunited with his grandson Monday evening after Aiden was taken to the local police station.

"When I picked him up, he said, 'Are Mommy and Daddy coming soon?'" Levberg said Tuesday. "He doesn't understand."

**Katherine Goldstein**

Goldstein's husband described her as an easygoing travel companion who was always game to visit far-flung locales.

"She didn't complain," Craig Goldstein told The New York Times. "She was always along for the ride."

Goldstein, 64 was a mother of two daughters in

their early 20s, Cassie and Alana.

She attended the parade with her older daughter so that Cassie could reunite with friends from high school, her husband said.

Goldstein said his wife had recently lost her mother and had given thought to what kind of arrangements she might want when she dies.

He recalled that Katherine, an avid bird watcher, said she wanted to be cremated and to have her remains scattered in the Montrose Beach area of Chicago, where there is a bird sanctuary.

**Steve Straus**

Straus was remembered as a family man who loved the arts and Chicago.

He was an exceptional joke-teller, an avid reader and a "culture vulture" who enjoyed the artistic fruits of the Art Institute and the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, family members said Tuesday. Energetic beyond his years, Straus commuted on the Metra five days a week

to his office downtown, where he worked as a stockbroker.

He was "very curious about the world," said his son, Peter Straus.

A longtime Highland Park resident who was born and raised on the Chicago's South Side, his son Jonathan Straus described Steve Straus as "a product of Chicago."

**Nicolas Toledo**

Toledo was a grandfather who'd recently returned from his native Morelos, Mexico, to spend time with his family after retiring several years ago.

His family said he was the father of eight and a grandfather to many who'd spent most of his life in the Chicago area but had returned to his hometown after retiring several years ago.

At the start of the parade, he was sitting in a wheelchair surrounded by children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren when the gunshots rang out; he reportedly was killed instantly.

The Coyote Creek Mining Company, L.L.C., 6502 17th Street SW, Zap, North Dakota 58580 has filed an application (Revision No. 12) to Permit NACC-1302 to revise surface coal mining activities. The permit revision revises the post-mining topography in portions of the E½E½ of Section 1, T142N, R89W, Section 6 and the N½N½ of Section 7, T142N, R88W, of the Fifth Principal Meridian, Mercer County, North Dakota. It also clarifies timing of native grassland seedings in the variance areas to align with the approved narrative in the Vegetation Assessment and Success Standards in Section 4.3.1. 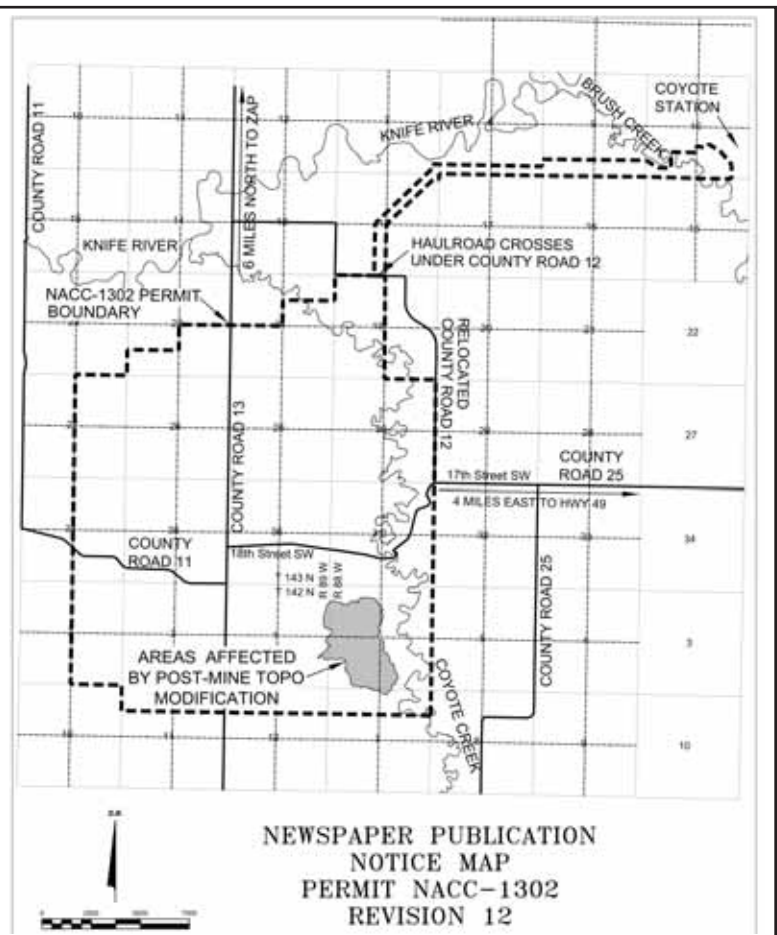
