



INDIANAPOLIS - Republicans in some heavily conservative states won their campaigns for secretary of state last year after claiming they would make sweeping changes aimed at keeping fraud out of elections.

So far, their efforts to make good on their promises are mixed, in some cases because their rhetoric has bumped up against skepticism from members of their own party.

Electrical update planned for Oliver County Fairgrounds

An electrical and light upgrade for the Oliver County Fairgrounds was approved Jan. 29 by the fair board.

According to Board President Mikael Schmidt, the board accepted a bid for the improvements made necessary by electrical problems and a dead short somewhere in the existing overhead wires and light fixtures.

Schmidt said the \$47,000 project will include removal of the existing overhead electrical wires and poles and updating the main panel.

"We are going to set eight poles with fixtures on them and move all our electrical wires underground." Schmidt said.

Schmidt said the board was able to purchase lighting and poles that are being removed from the Mandan Arena. He said the project would also include updating the lighting and crow's nest at the fairgrounds.

"This is a big undertaking for our board," Schmidt said. "We plan to finance the project locally to get the ball rolling."

Schmidt estimates the project will be complete by June 1 so the arena will be ready for Old Settler's Days.

"We are working on some grant leads," Schmidt said, "and we are asking for donations to the project."

Schmidt said donations of \$1,000 or more will be recognized by permanent signage at the arena.

The improvements, including setting semi-permanent pens behind the bucking chutes at the fairgrounds would serve to make the facility more useable.

"We were renting or relying on donated panels and setting and tearing down every year after the fair," Schmidt said. "This would potentially attract some other types of events that would like to come in."





Safety shouldn't be left to pancakes

There's a saying, "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." When you purchase insurance, you're preparing for when the unexpected happens. Suppose you're involved in a car accident or house fire. In that case, you need insurance coverage to pay for the damage and treatment of any injuries. Purchasing insurance is a proactive move, and so is investing in community resources that prevent and lessen the effects of the unexpected.

In 2022, fire departments and districts across North Dakota responded to 48,349 incidents, with 2,751 being fires, according to the State Fire Marshal. Onethird of those were structure fires, including homes and businesses. Over \$46.2 million in property was lost due to fires in 2022. To best serve our communities, these local departments need to be given the best tools and training to do their jobs.

North Dakota consumers pay property insurance premiums on their homeowners, renters, and other lines of insurance. Depending on the amount of premiums collected in the state, insurance companies turn over a small percentage to the Insurance Department. These are then disbursed to fire districts and departments across the state. However, state law limits how much can be sent to fire departments. Whatever remains of the taxes are turned over to the General Fund, the state's general checkbook.

In 2019, the State Auditor released a report that noted property insurance premiums could be lowered if more funding was given to local fire districts. Property insurance premiums may be based on a city or fire district's ISO rating, which scores how prepared an area is to manage fires. That means you could pay less for property and homeowners' insurance by having a more trained and equipped fire department.

The North Dakota Legislature began its 80-day session in early January. By passing Senate Bill 2211, your local representatives in Bismarck can give fire districts the tools they need to protect all of us better. From state-of-the-art equipment in LaMoure to advanced training in Killdeer and everywhere in between, we can better protect our communities and families. Simply relying on pancake feeds and raffles to fund our safety isn't going to cut it.

Funding for first responders has never been more critical, including our volunteer fire services. These men and women volunteer to protect our property, help save lives and protect our loved ones. At the very least, we should send the dollars we as consumers pay in dedicated insurance premiums back to those men and women on the front lines. Our local fire departments mean so much to our communities and the safety of our families. SB 2211 is our opportunity to put our money where it belongs at the local fire department. Please join me in supporting SB 2211.





A Late Winter Weather Forecast Blast from the Past

Dickey County people who know their local history are aware of the USDA weather station, located on the east edge of Ellendale, that conducted atmospheric research with instrument-laden kites and balloons from 1917 to 1933. This was a move toward scientific weather predictions. But few are aware of where people turned for weather predictions prior to the advent of such scientific work.

One of those sources was Rev. Irl R. Hicks, a famous "weather prophet," who from 1894 until his death in 1916 published a yearly almanac called "Word and Works." The almanac was a huge seller, especially in rural areas, and it made a fortune for Hicks. What sort of predictions did this "weather prophet" make? Samples can be found in the Dickey County Leader, which, beginning in the 1890's, regularly published his predictions, and continued doing so until his demise in 1916.

A good idea of the nature of Hicks' theories about weather can be gleaned from this column, published in the January 31, 1899 Leader. Enjoy.


Weather Forecasts for the Following Month

We are careful to state in the outset that a Venus period is in control on the 15th day of this month, and that its influence upon weather and general meteorological conditions will be felt from the beginning to the end of February, and into early March. The greatest disturbances will fall during the last half of the month, when Earth, Venus and Mercury will combine with other causes to produce storms, blizzards, great extremes of temperature and atmospheric perturbations.

A regular storm period the last days of January will be closing about February 1st, hence storm conditions will be disappearing toward the Atlantic, and cold, fair weather will be following on from western and central sections. On and touching the 4th and 5th, the barometer will fall, it will grow warmer, and rain and snow will visit most parts of the country. The moon will stand at its extreme South point on the 5th, causing drift of polar winds southward and producing sharp cold over much of the country behind the reactionary storms due about the 4th and 5th.

During the Vulcan storm period central on the 9th, the moon will come nearest to us on the 8th, will be new,

or in conjunction with the Sun, on the 10th, and on the celestial equator on the 11th.The greatest disturbances

to 23rd, and 26th to 28th. Many sections will be visited by sweeping wind and rain storms, while northern and northwestern regions most likely feel some of the winters worst blizzards. The full moon on or near the equator at the vernal equinox is almost sure to be followed by heavy storms of rain and thunder southward, turning to sleet, snow and blizzards in northern sections. These storm conditions exist on the 25th and 26th, combined with all the other disturbing factors indicated therein. We cannot too strongly urge our readers to make preparations for protecting livestock against the probable fury of late winter storms at this time.

Hunter Education Course Begins March 25th



February 6, 2023 — While today, many young adults consider college a time to become independent, in the early 1900s, college was a different sort of experience, and on this date in 1908, the University of North Dakota announced a new rule for co-eds: if they wanted to go downtown after 6 o'clock, they needed written permission from their parents.

This rule came to pass because one night, a number of students went to the theater instead of a law school dance, and a member of the faculty saw them there and reported them.

Bad Lands Cow Boy by Jayme L. Job

February 7, 2023 — Arthur Packard established the Bad Lands Cow Boy newspaper at Medora on this date in 1884. Medora's first newspaper, the Cow Boy recorded the town's earliest history. A journalist with a fascination for cowboys, Packard headed west soon after his graduation from the University of Michigan. He became managing editor of the Bismarck Tribune, although the stint proved short due to his notorious temper; Packard resigned after throwing sundries at local critics. He moved across the river and worked on the Mandan Pioneer, but soon continued west to Medora. After converting a blacksmith shop into a make-shift printing office, Packard released the Cow Boy's first issue. The owner, writer, editor, and manager of the paper, Packard once wrote, "The Cow Boy is not published for fun, but for \$2 a year."

Today, Packard and his paper are best known for recording much of Theodore Roosevelt's life in the badlands, as well as forecasting correctly young Roosevelt's future presidency.

Roosevelt became close friends with the young editor, and spent many hours telling stories and arguing politics in the Cow Boy's office. The future president claimed that he preferred the newspaper office to the town's many saloons, saying he avoided the "...booze joints, because he liked chatting with the men who liked the smell of printer's ink to feel civilized." He believed that the "...saloons were the cowboy's nemesis," while Packard was, according to him, "...a good fellow, a college graduate, and a first-class baseball player." The Marquis de Mores also spent many hours in Packard's office. When locals accused the editor of bias favoring the Marquis, Packard replied that the Marquis was the paper's best advertising customer, but he never let his friendship with the powerful de Mores affect his editorial instincts.

In the Cow Boy's third issue, he wrote, "We are not the tool of nor are we beholden in any way to any man or set of men..." Of course, the fact that Packard dined most nights in the Marquis's chateau did not help matters.

Unfortunately, Medora's boom lasted only as long as the paper itself; a devastating fire in January of 1887 destroyed Packard's office. Along with most of the city's residents, Packard left Medora after that brutal winter, making the Cow Boy's December 23rd issue its last.

Huff Indian Village Historic Site by Jim Davis

February 8, 2023 — In 1966, the National Historic Preservation Act was created to help preserve the diverse archaeological and architectural treasures of America. As the homesteaders' plows began turning over the prairie sod, only minimal curiosity and concern was given to the remnants of earlier civilizations. Various effigies, tipi rings and burial mounds were removed with little trace left behind, and village sites were lost to cultivation. Fortunately, along the Missouri River, a number of sites have been saved. Although mapped as early as 1908 by Ernest Steinbrueck, it was 1997 that the Huff Village site was nominated as a National Historic Landmark.

Located along the river, sixteen miles south of Mandan, the site is a classic prehistoric Mandan settlement dating to about AD 1450. The village covers about twelve acres. Beginning in 1938, extensive excavations have revealed depressions marking more than one hundred lodges. The large, well-planned community was surrounded by a massive fortification system consisting of a ditch more than two thousand feet long with ten well-defined bastions. A ceremonial lodge dominated the center of the village.

Perhaps a thousand or more people once lived there. The lodges were roughly arranged in rows, each around 40 to 47 feet in length and 25 to 35 feet wide, but weren't quite rectangular as the ends varied in width by approximately five feet. Four-foot side walls surrounded Continued Page 16



Grazing Guidelines

The snow is melting, the mud is here and the pastures have begun to come to life. Soon we will get to see the beautiful North Dakota prairies swaying in the wind again. Cattle will soon be taken out to pasture to utilize that wonderful natural resource we have. It is important to remember that our pastures do require more management than just fixing fence and letting the cattle out. Timing of grazing, degree of utilization and grazing system all make a difference in the life and quality of the pasture.

Grazing readiness is the vegetative growth stage at which grazing can begin without permanent damage to the vegetation or soil. Readiness is determined by height as well as leaf stage. Native grass species should be at 3.5 leave stage. This means that on the main stem. there should be three leaves fully extended and another partially extended. Introduced grass species should be at the 3-leaf stage, with three leaves on the main stem fully extended. Plant height is also important and varies among species. Shorter statured species such as Kentucky bluegrass, crested wheatgrass, and little bluestem should be a minimum of four inches tall. Alfalfa, slender wheatgrass and western wheatgrass require a minimum height of six inches. Tall species such as big bluestem, creeping foxtail, reed canary grass, and smooth bromegrass require eight inches of growth before grazing should begin.

Rotational grazing systems require the movement of grazing animals from one unit of pasture to another in a specific sequence. This method is highly recommended over season-long grazing because it promotes

vegetative growth. Rotational systems require three paddocks at minimum to be effective. The number of paddocks included in a rotation should be determined by the goals, abilities, terrain and water access. Pastures should be given 30-65 days of rest between grazing periods. This will provide adequate time for plants to recover in ideal conditions. As the grazing season progresses and vegetative growth slows, the recovery period between grazing periods should increase.

The degree of utilization also has an effect on the life and health of pastures. Degree of utilization is the proportion of the current year's forage production that has been consumed or destroyed through grazing. What is considered proper utilization varies among species, but they all do poorly when overgrazed. The recommended utilization rate is moderate to full use. Moderate use means 20-40% of forage has been consumed/destroyed. Full utilization level means that about 40-60% of forage has been consumed/destroyed. The amount of vegetative growth above ground affects the root growth below ground. More green material to photosynthesis allows for more root growth and helps the plants survive winter.








NORTH DAKOTA STATE LEGISLATURE District 36 Rep. Dori Hauck

The 68th Legislative Session is entering the last 25 days. Committee work and floor sessions continue every day to amend proposed legislation. Hundreds of bills have passed both chambers and have been signed by the Governor and filed with the Secretary of State. Here are a few of the changes to North Dakota laws and policy you might not have heard about:

HB1409 changed Game and Fish youth license for small game and waterfowl. A nonresident youth under 16 years old may purchase a general game rather than small game hunting license. The youth hunter may hunt the entire

youth AND regular small game and waterfowl sessions.



SB2302 updated the organ transplant process. Language was added that a person may not discriminate against a organ transplant recipient based solely on the recipient's mental or physical disability unless the disability is determined medically significant to the gift. One example provided during testimony was a 3.5 month old child who was denied a heart transplant because he had Down syndrome. The child passed away in 2021. In an effort to provide all with a

SB2111 allows a vehicle's certificate of title to be in electronic form. This reduces paper transfer for lien holders. However, paper titles will continue to

HB1080 allows a vehicle's registration card to be carried in the vehicle on paper or an electronic version. The electronic version is provided by the Department of Transportation to be stored on a smart device which can then be provided to any peace or highway patrol officer requesting inspection. Allowing for an electronic version was supported by farmers who own multiple vehicles with multiple drivers. If the paper copy did not make it into the glove compartment, an electronic version is acceptable.

As defined by statute, the 68th Legislative Assembly must complete its work in 80 working days. You can view the standing committee meetings and floor

Spring greetings! I won't feel comfortable saying it's done snowing until about the 4th of July, but the warmer weather forecasted for the next few days is certainly encouraging! I know I'm not alone in saying I am ready for spring and being able to enjoy nicer days outside!

We are in the thick of things at the legislature, with a little bit of everything taking place. Between bill-signings, conference committees, long voting sessions and bill concurring, it has been quite a busy time

One of the bills of which I was the primary sponsor, HB1511, was signed into law! As a reminder, this bill provides tax incentives to new businesses that use coal as the feedstock for their products. Some examples of these products are building materials, such as siding, concrete or mortar, or products made with rare earth elements. Rare earth elements are most often used for technology-based products, like smartphones, laptops, lighting devices and military aircraft. There is incredible potential for District 33 with this new law because the materials must be processed on site! After David Straley from North American Coal volunteered to hash out the details with the tax department, I was both proud and excited to sponsor this next-generation bill!

We are in the final stretch of this legislative session. I am thankful for the calls, emails and text messages. Thank you for those, but more importantly for the prayers! I am honored to serve you!

Our Legislative week and work load was a bit more normal this week with less celebrative events, while wrapping up most committees. Several Conference Committee's have begun to meet in effort to come to a respectful and reasonable resolution to amended bills in the opposite chamber, and allowing them to pass into law or possibly resulting in defeat of certain bills.

The final 3 bills were debated, amended and passed out of the House Ag Committee.

SB 2279 which relates to a farm structure and improvements property tax exemption. It was amended to pertain to potato warehouses only. It received a 13-0 Do pass recommendation.

SB 2096 relates to hemp commodity or products, including CBD, and administrative rules. It received an 11-2 Do pass recommendation.

SB 2371 relates to the power of counties and municipalities to prohibit local development by a foreign adversary. It received a 12-1 Do pass recommendation. I will be presenting SB 2371 to the Floor Session of House Chamber later this week, asking for a unanimous Do Pass.

This weeks IBL committee worked on the following bills:

SB 2266: Relating to credit union membership. This bill would expand the field of membership for credit union from the current 75-mile radius to a 125 mile radius. This was defeated on the House floor. 39 Yea and 53 Nay.

SB 2299: Relating to purchases by scrap metal dealers; and to provide a penalty. Because of the large increase in the number of thefts of catalytic converters, there is an increased fine. Also, there are restrictions on who can buy and sell, requiring registering with the attorney general's office as a scrap metal dealer.

HCR 3036: Relating to the adoption of a Central Bank Digital Currency in the United States. This resolution urges Congress not to support legislation, or other efforts, relating to the adoption of a Central Bank Digital Currency in the United States. This House Concurrent Resolutions was brought forward to cleanup an oversight when HB 1082 passed and was signed by the Governor.

We continue to hope and pray for the Governor's signature on HB 1254 and like bills this week in an effort to protect our minor children.





This week feels a little heavy around here. We had a strong focus on mental health last week and while one maybe wouldn't correlate celebration with mental health, we do. Every time we offer a session in Oakes that brings this challenging subject into the light, we want to celebrate it. The levels of vulnerability and trust needed to speak up when you're struggling are huge; the environment we live in influences that willingness and ability. We want to celebrate that last week, Oakes took another step towards being the kind of community that destigmatizes mental health struggles and is open to hearing the truth, even when it's hard. Any little thing we can do to keep our loved ones here another day will always be worth celebrating.

Things to celebrate...

News to know...

At our mental health sessions last week, licensed counselor (and our new friend) Monica McConkey, shared some truly staggering statistics. North Dakota ranks 16th in deaths

by suicide. Suicide is the 11th leading cause of death overall and specifically for groups aged 10-24, 25-34, and 35-44, it is the SECOND leading cause of death in North Dakota. We are losing our young ones at a rapid rate to suicide. We share this not to create more fear but to shed light on the truth that what we've been doing to address mental health isn't working. We encourage you to go to www.growingsmalltowns. org and check out the blog post called Mental Resources for All Small Towns. It contains video recordings from Monica's sessions along with a host of other resources. We can't keep pretending this doesn't exist or that it's an "out-there" problem; we need to keep talking about it and keep encouraging each other to talk when we're struggling.

Ideas to spread...

One of our biggest takeaways from this past week with Monica was simply this: we can't give what we don't have. To everyone who believes that we can externally care our way to

internal health and well-being, we might be overlooking the simple truth that if we're not whole and healthy ourselves, we're unable to serve others as fully. This reminder matters and is so worth spreading. The larger cultural narrative might be ego-driven and selfish; locally, due to our cultural backgrounds, general stoicism, and Midwest passive-aggressive nature, which we've labeled "North Dakota nice", we're far more likely to kill ourselves at the expense of serving everyone else. The only way to combat this is to openly and honestly share when we're struggling, making it safe for others to follow. If we continue to present ourselves like we never hurt, feel pain, or struggle with life, we continue to set that standard for everyone around us. Then when it's not met, people feel like they're doing something wrong. It's tricky down here. Being human is hard. We need you to be OK. Self-care isn't selfish.


\$1,000 Dakota Valley Electric scholarships available

NOTICE OF FILINGS AND PUBLIC HEARINGS

On October 17, 2022, SCS Carbon Transport LLC (SCS) filed applications for a certificate of corridor compatibility and for a route permit concerning approximately 320 miles of carbon dioxide pipeline ranging from 4.5 to 24-inch diameter and associated facilities in Burleigh, Cass, Dickey, Emmons, Logan, McIntosh, Morton, Oliver, Richland and Sargent Counties, North Dakota.

Also on October 17, 2022, SCS filed an application for waivers of procedures and time schedules established under North Dakota Century Code Sections 49-22.1-05, 49-22.1-08 and 49-22.1-10, and North Dakota Administrative Code Sections 69-06-01-02 and Chapter 69-06-06, requiring separate filings, time schedules, notices, hearings, and requirements on such applications.

The Commission has determined that four separate public hearings will be held and scheduled as follows, with each providing an overview of the project, but focusing on specific geographic portions of March 14, 2023, at 8:30 a.m. Central Time, at the ND Heritage Center & State Museum, Russell

April 11, 2023, at 9:00 a.m. Central Time, at the Harry Stern and Ella Stern Cultural Center, ND State College of Science, 820 6th Street Oval, Wahpeton, ND 58075. This hearing will focus primarily on portions of the project in Cass and Richland Counties.

May 9, 2023, at 9:00 a.m. Central Time, at Emmons County Courthouse Auditorium, 100 4th Street NW, Linton, ND 58552. This hearing will focus primarily on portions of the project in Emmons, Logan, and McIntosh Counties.



"The investigation has been ongoing since Jan. 16, 2023 with the Wahpeton Police Department and the North Dakota Bureau of Criminal Investigation working a joint investigation into the murder of Jeremiah Medenwald," Anderson stated. "At this time, the complexities of the investigation have made it so that the state feels that waiting on all outstanding information, search warrants and ongoing interviews are in the interest of ensuring a successful prosecution against the person responsible."

Anderson, on Tuesday, reiterated that the Wahpeton Police Department believes Medenwald's murder was an isolated incident and that the public is not in

"He's still a person of interest," Anderson said about Kruger. "The investigation has not changed and is continu-

The Wahpeton Police Department continues to ask that anyone with information about Jeremiah Medenwald in the days preceding Jan. 16, 2023, and information regarding Anthony Kruger from Jan. 16-20, 2023, contact Sgt. Rick Teberg at 701-642-7728.

A preliminary hearing and/or arraignment for Kruger is scheduled for Monday, March 6. As of 3 p.m. Tuesday, he was confined in the Richland County Jail.

By focusing on solar, wind, hydroelectric, hydrogen and biomass energy sources, lawmakers hope for a carbon-free future in energy production. This means any public utility that generates electricity will not be allowed to emit any carbon dioxide in

less than 20 years. This will limit the state's ptions for coal and natural gas energy sources. According to Sen. Jordan Rasmusson, R-District 9, the bill also notably fails to consider use of nuclear energy, which the U.S. Department of Energy categorizes as "clean and sustainable."

Those opposed to the bill worry it is too stringent and will negatively affect Minnesota's energy grid

to innovate, create jobs, incorporate new technologies into the grid and work closely with the communities that are home to our employees and power plants on a successful transition," Clark stated.

Electrical utilities in Minnesota have already taken steps toward carbon-free energy, prior to this year's bill. Between 2005 and 2020, the state saw a 56% decline in carbon emissions, according to the Greenhouse Gas Report. SF 4 will allow these companies to continue their clean energy efforts in a flexible, but planned time frame.

In addition to creating a sound timeline, the bill establishes a standard

for utilities to supply Minnesotans with electricity generated from carbon-free resources at 80% of retail sales in 2030. Then, each five years, public utilities will need to increase that number by 10 percentage points, until 100% is reached in 2040.

In 2035, at least 55% of an electric utility's total retail sales must be generated from eligible energy technologies.

Officials anticipate this bill will offer enhanced benefits during implementation including, but not limited to the creation of high-quality jobs, recognition of workers' rights, guaranteed access to the necessary tools for success, established that all Minnesotans have access to the benefits of a clean energy economy and provided affordable electric services, according to the governor's office.

Doubts about the bill's effectiveness and need in the state have been raised by Republicans and opponents of the bills since day

"The Blackout Bill, simply, fails to make energy affordable and reliable. As technology progresses, our energy sector continues to become cleaner and reduces carbon emissions," Rasmusson stated. "This top-down government mandate will have no tangible environmental benefits but will cost Minnesota consumers and threaten grid reliability."



On October 17, 2022, SCS Carbon Transport LLC (SCS) filed applications for a certificate of corridor compatibility and for a route permit concerning approximately 320 miles of carbon dioxide pipeline ranging from 4.5 to 24-inch diameter and associated facilities in Burleigh, Cass, Dickey, Emmons, Logan, McIntosh, Morton, Oliver, Richland and Sargent Counties, North Dakota.

Also on October 17, 2022, SCS filed an application for waivers of procedures and time schedules established under North Dakota Century Code Sections 49-22.1-05, 49-22.1-08 and 49-22.1-10, and North Dakota Administrative Code Sections 69-06-01-02 and Chapter 69-06-06, requiring separate filings, time schedules, notices, hearings, and requirements on such applications.
