

NFL defends TV broadcast strategy

The National Football League defended its TV broadcast strategy Wednesday as the Federal Communications Commission reviews the growing shift of live sports to pay TV and subscription services away from broadcast networks.

The NFL met with FCC staff on Friday, according to documents dated Tuesday and made public Wednesday. The NFL said more than 87% of its games are aired on free broadcast TV and 100% of local market games are broadcast on local over-the-air TV. The league said the percentage of games aired on broadcast TV has varied little

for two decades.

“This distribution model is good for our fans, for local television broadcasters, for our 32 clubs in small and large markets alike, and for the competitiveness of the game itself,” the NFL told the FCC.

The NFL noted 86 of the top 100 TV programs in 2025 were NFL games and said games are strategically picked weekly to put the most compelling game into each broadcast market. The league noted Sunday Night Football on Comcast’s NBC has been the No. 1 program in primetime for 15 years.

Major broadcast station owners including Fox Corp. and Sinclair said last month

the FCC should address the trend of Big Tech companies acquiring the rights to broadcast football, baseball and other sporting events, saying it could weaken local TV news.

A group of more than 700 affiliate stations for Paramount’s CBS, NBC, FOX and Disney-owned ABC last week urged the FCC to take action “to keep marquee sports programming available on free over-the-air broadcast television for American viewers” saying “sporting events can’t unify Americans if the cost of watching them turns us into a nation of haves and have-nots.”

The National Association

of Broadcasters said global streaming giants like Amazon Prime, Alphabet, Apple and Netflix can use live sports programming as a loss leader.

A 1961 law exempts major sports leagues from antitrust laws and allows them to pool their individual teams’ television rights and sell those rights as a package.

No long-term deal for Dallas receiver

The Dallas Cowboys will make wide receiver George Pickens play the 2026 season under the franchise tag, chief operating officer Stephen Jones said Wednesday.

“We’ve made a decision,” Jones told reporters in a pre-draft press conference. “. There won’t be negotiations on a long-term deal.”

The Cowboys placed the franchise tag on Pickens Feb. 27, the first time they had done so since 2022 with tight end Dalton Schultz.

22.4 points per game. She set NSIC records for free throws made, three-pointers attempted and was among the national leaders in free throws made and attempted. The NSIC North Division Player of the Year, Kinnebrew led the league in scoring and ranked fourth in assists, leading U-Mary to 23 wins.

Strausbaugh won a national championship at 133 pounds for the Marauders wrestling team. The NSIC rookie of the year from Soldotna, Alaska, went 25-2 on the season and was 19-1 vs. NCAA Division II opponents.

Cayden Kraft and Kennedy Stormer of Bismarck State were named the four-year NAIA college athletes of the year.

Kraft, a sophomore Legacy graduate, was named the Frontier Conference’s Most Valuable Athlete and the indoor track athlete of the year. He won the 400 and 800 and ran on the winning 1600 relay at the conference meet. He finished seventh in the 400 at the national meet and the relay came in fourth. During the outdoor season, Kraft has qualified for nationals and is ranked sixth in the 400.

Stormer, in her final year of college eligibility, led the Frontier in scoring. The

Mandan native averaged 22.1 points per game, which ranked third in the NAIA. She ranked third in the league with 3.7 assists per game, third in steals (2.2) and ninth in rebounds (4.9). Stormer

was named to the all-conference first team and eclipsed the 1,000-point mark in her college career as the Mystics qualified for the conference tournament in their first season in the NAIA.

Zi White Woman and Ronessa Sazue of United Tribes were named the two-year college athletes of the year.

White Woman averaged 17.9 points, 6.1 rebounds and 2 assists per game while

shooting 23 percent from the field and 74 percent at the free throw line for UTTC. The sophomore from Rapid City, S.D., was named first-team all-Mon-Dak and all-region.

Sazue averaged 20.7 points, 9.2 rebounds and 1.5 assists for the Thunderbirds. A sophomore from Fort Thompson, S.D., she was named the Region XII MVP and was named to the all-conference first team.

Linette Olson and Jim Haussler were named winners of the Rog Higgins Award. The award named for the long-time Bismarck sportscaster is presented for outstanding contributions in Bismarck athletics.

On October 3, 2025, the Public Service Commission received the application for Revision 14 Surface Coal Mining Permit NACC-1302 from The Coyote Creek Mining Company, L.L.C., for its Coyote Creek Mine south of Zap in Mercer County. Revision No. 14 revises the post-mining topography in portions of Sections 23, 24, 25, 26, and 36, T143N, R89W; Section 31, T143N, R88W; and Section 6, T142N, R88W. in the world, and they’ve been unbelievable so far in this series,” said Wild forward Marcus Johansson of Kaprizov and Boldy, before Game 3.

Sharing a line with Boldy and Joel Eriksson Ek — each

of whom scored twice in the Wild’s 6-1 Game 1 win in Dallas — Johansson noted that if the Stars double-cover one player, that will naturally leave others open with a chance to make a game-changing play.

“We can’t just rely on them. All of us need to step up,” he said. “I mean, we played good. We could’ve

been up after the first period of Game 2, but that’s just the way it goes sometimes. And yeah, we’ve all gotta pull on the rope and we’ve all gotta help out.”

the Mets starting pitcher for the third time.

It was the first extra-base hit Clay Holmes allowed to a righthanded hitter in five starts this year.

The Twins left two more runners on base after Buxton’s 409-foot blast. Victor Caratini drew a two-out walk and Kody Clemens followed with a double that shot past first baseman Vientos. Keaschall, however, hit an infield pop-up on a first-pitch sinker.

In the bottom of the sixth, Vientos drew a two-out walk against Rojas. Semien, the

next batter, hit a full-count changeup off the left-field wall for a double, but Vientos was easily thrown out at the plate on an accurate relay throw from Twins shortstop Brooks Lee.

The Twins compiled five hits in seven innings against Holmes. Trevor Larnach hit a leadoff double in the fourth inning and moved to third on a groundout. Larnach scored when Caratini lined out to center and Mets center fielder Luis Robert Jr. made a wild throw to the plate.

Prielipp lasted just four innings in his debut, giving up two runs while striking out six. He surrendered a leadoff double to Bo Bichette

in the first inning, on his third pitch in the big leagues, and the Mets turned it into a run when Francisco Lindor hit a two-out RBI infield single to third base.

After Lindor’s infield single, Prielipp retired eight consecutive batters, which included striking out the side in the second inning. He spun his slider for more than half his pitches in his introduction to major league hitters.

Lindor lined a single off third baseman Royce Lewis’ glove in the fourth inning. Francisco Alvarez drilled the next pitch, an 87-mph slider that sat over the middle of the plate, into the right-center gap for an RBI

double. Lindor scored from first base, sliding ahead of a relay throw, but he left the game afterward because of left calf tightness.

Prielipp, Baseball America’s No. 4 prospect in the Twins farm system and No. 81 overall, threw 82 pitches across four innings.

It was the first time the Twins had two players make their MLB debuts in the same game since April 7, 1999, according to the Twins TV broadcast.

In a 9-3 loss to the Toronto Blue Jays, in the second game of the 1999 season, the Twins saw three pitchers debut. Mike Lincoln made his first career start, while Dan Perkins and Joe

Mays pitched the final three innings in each of their debuts.

The Twins will conclude their three-game inter-league series with the Mets at 6:10 p.m. Thursday, April 23. Joe Ryan (2-2, 3.29 ERA) will make his sixth start of the season and his first career start at Citi Field.

The Mets will send righthander Christian Scott to the mound. Scott hasn’t pitched in the big leagues since he underwent Tommy John surgery during the middle of the 2024 season, his rookie year. At Class AAA Syracuse this year, Scott had a 5.27 ERA over three starts with 17 strikeouts and two walks in 13²/₃ innings.

Vikings will be drafting the best player available rather than drafting for need. The latter often causes issues because it influences evaluators to see what they want to see as a way to justify potentially reaching on a certain prospect.

That objectivity will

be tested as soon as the Vikings are on the clock at No. 18. There’s a hole in the secondary with veteran safety Harrison Smith contemplating retirement, and while Oregon safety Dillion Thieneman might fill that need, it will be interesting to see how the Vikings proceed if other blue chip prospects are available.

What if somebody like Oregon tight end Kenyon

Sadiq is still up for grabs? What if somebody such as Arizona State receiver Jordan Tyson is staring them in the face? What if somebody like Utah offensive lineman Spencer Fano falls into their laps?

“Once we have the board stacked objectively based on ability, then we identify who are the best fits,” Brzezinski said. “We want to make sure that we’re not passing on a

unique talent to fill a need.”

A player that might not have the biggest impact this season could be a cornerstone next season; that’s something the Vikings will have to consider as they evaluate all their options.

“We’re trying to cluster a group of players that we would like to target at No. 18 and try to get them ranked the way that we’d like to take them,” Brzezinski said.

“You never know what’s going to happen.”

That’s why objectivity has been so important to Brzezinski in his preparation for the 2026 NFL Draft. He wants to eliminate all emotion so that everybody can focus on the task at hand with a clear mind.

“Our goal is to get this right and we will,” Brzezinski said. “We’re ready to go.”

SAFETY AND SPEED:

City commission approves four-way stop by new therapy

With a sudden surge of interest in one new business and service in town, and a large amount of vehicles and children involved in that interest, the city commission moved forward earlier this week with a new four-way stop for the busy intersection.

The commission spoke with Hazen Police Chief Jim Wolff regarding the 1st St. SW and 1st Ave. SW intersection, where 701 Therapy and the Hazen Post Office are located. Wolff said he did not see speed as a major issue when patrolling the intersection, saying there could be a crosswalk put in.

Commissioner Jesse Folkerts, who initially brought up patrolling and possible city action to address the intersection, disagreed.

"With all due respect, I totally disagree," he said. "I think it is just a total change of use case."

Folkerts noted that the presence and success of 701 Therapy meant there were a large number of people parking and walking across the streets at or near the intersection, and usually

with children in the parking vehicles or as part of the crossing.

Folkerts moved to put in a four-way stop at the 1st Ave. and 1st St. intersection, with Commissioner Dustin Wiedrich seconding. Commissioner Jason Haack noted additional patrolling may be necessary as residents adjust to the new four-way stop.

Commissioner Casey Stern noted his concern that there are too many places in town where vehicles have to stop, then move, then stop again, saying he did not think some of these stop signs were necessary. He asked if stop signs could be removed from a different location, even as signs are put up at the 1st and 1st crossing.

The other commissioners agreed with Stern that some of the intersections with stop signs currently did not actually need the signs. They mentioned picking out some examples of where the signs might not be necessary and coming back with recommendations at a later meeting.

The vote on putting up the four stop signs at the 1st St. and 1st Ave. intersection

was unanimously approved by the commission.

"Don't step on a crack or you'll break your mamma's back," an old adage goes. It is a good thing this is just superstition, because otherwise the state of walking trails in Hazen provide prime opportunity for some backs to wind up broken.

During a Hazen City Commission meeting April 20, Wiedrich and City Engineer Jerod Klabunde with Moore Engineering brought up the issue of continued cracking and heaving on the multi-use walking/biking trails in town, notably the trail running east from TSC, crossing Highway 200 near Jimmy's Lounge and then proceeding east all the way to the golf course.

While pictures of various cracks were shown on the screen, Klabunde noted that this kind of cracking is very common when sidewalks or trails are shallow and unreinforced.

"The best option for the city is to replace the panels that are cracking," he said, noting that the city does not have rebar to put down and that crack sealing would
