



## JRMC Awards Paige Wilen with Legend Award



JAMESTOWN, N.D., Nov. 14, 2025 — Jamestown Regional Medical Center (JRMC) has honored emergency department registered nurse Paige Wilen with its prestigious Legend Award — the highest recognition given to JRMC employees.

The Legend Award celebrates individuals whose compassion, courage and commitment leave a lasting mark on the people they serve. Like the rings of a tree, their actions become part of a legacy that grows stronger with time.

Wilen was nominated by emergency medicine physician Dr. Steve English for the extraordinary care she provided to a patient and family during a recent emergency visit.

When the family arrived at JRMC facing homelessness, Wilen didn't hesitate. She stepped in as their advocate — and then went even further.

Realizing the family had nowhere to stay, Wilen personally offered to pay for a hotel room so they would not spend the night without shelter.

"Paige went over and beyond her nursing duties to ensure this family had shelter and a safe place to stay," English wrote in his nomination.

But her support didn't stop there. Over the following two days, Wilen worked tirelessly with local agencies and shelters to help the family secure long-term resources. Her efforts highlight the essen-

tial partnerships between JRMC and community organizations in addressing social determinants of health — and show how healthcare extends far beyond the walls of the medical center.

"Paige's compassion and perseverance directly protected a vulnerable family from the dangers of homelessness, while preserving their dignity during this time of crisis," English said.

Wilen's dedication reflects JRMC's mission. Her actions show the power of one person to change the trajectory of someone's life — a true embodiment of JRMC's culture, values and the spirit behind the Legend Award.

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# At 76, Bison Legend Joe Cichy Taking Coaching Page From Dad

Napoleon-Gackle-Streeter head coach turned to a College Hall of Famer to help with 9-man team.

It was not just another evening last summer at the Napoleon Golf Club when Jamison Fetting shot the round of his life, and it had nothing to do with a birdie or eagle. He scored an ace with one question to fellow league golfer Joe Cichy: Can you help me coach the football team?

Veteran Napoleon head coach Kelly McCleary had resigned to take a job in Washburn, and Fetting was the next in line. He has to be the youngest small-town high school coach in America

who has a member of the National College Football Hall of Fame on his staff.

"Honestly, it's kind of just incredible," Fetting said.

At 76 years old, Cichy, the legendary North Dakota State defensive back in the late 1960s and 1970 and a member of the Bison Athletic Hall of Fame, isn't slowing down much. After retiring from his law practice in Bismarck, he and his wife built a house 10 miles south of Dawson, North Dakota, in 2014 and started meeting people in the nearby Napoleon area.

One year later, he was asked if he could help out with the football team. It's in the blood. His father, Sid Cichy, built a powerhouse at Fargo Shanley High School, winning 16 state championships.

Joe was asked if he had any Sid qualities about his coaching. "I hope so," he said. "I'm not the one to judge that, but I hope I have a little bit."

Cichy helped with the Napoleon program for about three years until he had a heart valve replacement surgery, which put coaching aside. For a while, anyway. He came back again this year to help Fetting, who was a Napoleon player when Cichy was an assistant.

After the first day of practice, Cichy had the following thought after looking over the team: "I'm not sure we're going to win many games. They just weren't football players."

So, the coaching staff went to work, and Cichy rediscovered the most satisfying element of helping mentor young players. They do improve. It was a young team with just two seniors, and one got hurt midway through

the season. Freshmen started at six positions.

"It's the most rewarding thing, it was unbelievable the transformation of some of these kids," he said. "If we would have told the people in Napoleon we were going to win eight games, they would have said you're nuts."

They weren't nuts. Napoleon-Gackle-Streeter finished 8-3, reached the North Dakota 9-man quarterfinals before running into Hankinson. There were coaching challenges, like when a freshman running back ended up playing tight end and center because of injuries.

The 9-man title game Friday at the Fargodome matches LaMoure-Litchville/Marion vs. New Rockford-Sheyenne-Maddock, two unbeaten teams who pretty much scored at will this season. L-L/M averages 58.6 points. NR-S-M averages 63.6.

That's 9-man, between the teams, four fewer players on a regular-sized field, and because of that, Cichy says the cornerbacks play tighter.

"You can get to the edge quicker on offense," he said. "It's a little bit easier for the quarterback to scramble. There are a lot of gaps there if you have a good quarterback, give him a little time, and he can pick you apart."

Cichy hasn't seen New Rockford play and saw LaMoure on videotape when it played Hankinson. LaMoure is led by running back Gunner Thielges, a Bison commit.

On defense, LaMoure may have to channel an inner Joe Cichy, whose 53 solo tackles in 1969 stood as a team single-season record for 34 years. He is now 10th on the NDSU list, mostly because the nine spots in front of him are occupied by Division I FCS defenders who had the advantage of playing deep into the playoffs.

"LaMoure needs to control the ball; it sounds like the Rockets have a good quarterback and receivers," Cichy said. "A wide-open game in 9-man is pretty tough to cover."


